Clear the Table Happily

Why shouldn't clearing off the Shabbos and Yom Tov table after a meal be an exciting and happy family event, rather than like going to the dentist and pulling teeth?

Here's a strategy that my wife and I employed for many, many years, and it works wonders.

I would stare at the table and say, "I am looking at a certain item and whoever takes it off will get this lollypop/chocolate bar.

Of course, you might need a few other, smaller, chocolate chips, or miniature marshmallows, to keep people interested in participating. And people will be looking at me and saying, "Was this it? Was that it?" And I would give no indication.

Only when everything was cleared off we would have our team meeting, and I would say, "Would you be happy if it was him?" "Yes." "Would you be happy if it was her?"

"Yes." "Would you be happy if it would be that one?" "Yeah, yeah, sure—we'd all be happy."

I'd say, "Well, it was the salt-shaker." And one kid will go, "that was me!! I took off the saltshaker!" And everybody will say, "Yeah, but he got it last time!!" "Yes, next time you're going to get it."

In the meantime, the table got cleared, and people can't wait until the next chance to clear off the table.

Gut Shabbos!



Chewing our food sufficiently is important for our health. How much chewing is considered sufficient, and practically speaking, what do we do?

Do we chew our food enough?

According to the medical view one should chew his food until it's transformed into liquid form, without any solid bumps inside. It's hard to give an exact number of how many times we should bite to chew our food because it depends on what texture the food is. Watermelon does not require too many bites until its liquid, as opposed to raw almonds which needs much more chewing than other foods.

On average, they say to chew your food 32 times.

Many of us chew our food half of that amount, or even less than that. Try to pay attention next time you take a bite of chicken or salad and count how many bites you take. The number of 32 times for chewing is because that is the point, that the food gets properly liquefied, which is the stage for the stomachs digestive system to take over. The food is small enough and fine enough for all the gastric juices in the stomach to do its job properly.

This is the way Hashem set up our bodies, let's try to use it properly and not mis-

use it. Just like any good working machine – the stomach has to be treated properly to do its job.

Food should be chewed on average 32 times; many people chew their food much less than this amount. This seems strange, the more we chew our food – the more pleasure we receive from it. The more the food is broken down – the more we taste the food. Is everyone working on middas haprishus? Is everyone trying to minimize their pleasure from קעולם הזה

Rather we can look into the Torah – it tells us about \(\psi \psi \) — when he said "Haliteini na" he did not mean to pour the food into his mouth, he meant to pour it into his throat. Eisav didn't chew his food at all, he just had it whole.

The reason for this is because Eisav was in a very big rush, he lived a life of בהלה. He didn't have time to live a normal life; he didn't have time to calmly have a normal meal.

People spend a lot of time and money to have different pleasures from the world – but the simple, natural pleasure that Hashem gives to people – they don't have time for. Very often, this turns into a habit and regardless if we are in a rush or not – we chew pretty quickly.

Hashem gave us food to chew and enjoy, let's appreciate His chessed!

We have just gone through fifty-two amazing uplifting days when we soared high up. Some of us may have not noticed that we were flying, but that was the reality.

Starting with Erev Pesach as we burned the Yetzer Hara out of our hearts, thus preparing us for takeoff on the Seder night.

We spoke last week how malchus is so important for every Yid to tap into. As Hashem told us before kabbalas Hatorah "v'atem t'hiyu li mamleches kohanim legoy kaddosh." We said that even if we aren't kings yet but we are "b'nei melachim."

When we arrived by Kaabalas hatorah we were on a high. Its hard to imagine how far we have come. We have grown together so much and our souls are shining brighter than ever.

Why did Chazal specifically place Birchas Kohanim after the berachah of modim, why not after any of the other berachos in the shmoneh esrei?



We Yidden, enjoy including Hashem in our daily lives. In our conversations, in short greetings and partings, in our remarks, we'll usually verbally remember Hashem.

When we hope that something will work out well for us, it's with a prayer to Hashem.

When things already are going well, it's again with thanks to Hashem.

When we're feeling fine, when the food is good, and when we're enjoying the weather, it's always with Hashem.

At the doctor's or dentist's office. at work, and as we shop, Hashem is somewhere in our words.

While we're waiting at the train station or bus stop, we will probably be saying something about Hashem.

At a wedding, at a birthday party, and at family or friends reunions, we will continue to keep Hashem in our prayers, songs, blessings, praises, and simple friendly discussions.

The more we get used to involving Hashem in our lives, the more we will be using His Name, or a word that alludes to Him.

In the times of Boaz the Judge he instituted a minhag that Yidden should greet each other with the Name of Hashem.

"שיהא שם שמים שגור על פיהם"

So that Yidden should be used to using Hashem's name regularly upon greeting each other, in order to strengthen their Yiddishkeit.

We find that when Boaz came to his farm (where he eventually met his future wife Rus,) he greeted the workers with the words "Hashem Imuchem!"

To that, the workers replied "Yivarechicha Hashem!"

As a child, I was zoiche to grow up with hearing this kind of heilige language, in my parents' house

I remember building the sukkah with my father a"h.

held the hammer ready to knock in the nail each time

he would say "Be'ezer Hashem".

I loved to hear my father say that, The Emunah B'Hashem felt so real and tangible.

That's something we can't buy from anyone, anywhere, at any price.

It's something that we can acquire by learning by example, from the Avos in the Toirah. Then we can try to emulate their heilige behavior, and speech, and then hopefully we'll get somewhere, on our journey toward getting closer to Hashem.

When Yaakov Avinu came to serve his father the Pesach seudah before receiving the moiredige bruchois, as he spoke, he was using Hashem's name much more than Eisuv would've used it in his usual type of talk.

This aroused suspicion in the mind of his father Yitzchok Avinu.

He said "I can discern that this isn't Eisav, through this person's way of speech"

Eisav doesn't include the Sheim Shamayim so much in his lexicon.

I once heard a beautiful shiur from Rabbi Dovid Orlofsky about the term used in the teffilos :"מכל עם ולשוו מכל עם ולשוו

"Hashem chose us from all other nations and languages"

What is the meaning of the word לשון or language?

He went on to explain that each culture and nation has a great investment of time, money, and interest in a certain "thing".

What that "thing" is, will usually and most likely, become obvious to outsiders, by the way it is defined and expressed in the various, extensive choice of words, in that nation's language.

Their favorite "thing" will probably have lots of words, to try and describe it, in the best possible way.

The words will include feelings,



with perspectives of perfection from all angles.

Finally a clear picture, image and description of the "thing" will

emerge.

Let's take a look for example at Italians.

The Italians have many words to describe different types of noo-dles.

That's one of their favorite exciting "things".

Each noodle style, every single type of shape has a distinctive different name.

After considering it's exact size, and length, thickness, and width, that will again be a cause to deserve a separate, special, specific name.

That is because of the great status of importance those noodles have in their lives.

Then goes the long list of different names for every single slight variation, in the kinds of foods that are prepared, with different ingredients and recipes, together with those sorts of noodles.

With different sorts of cheeses, or meats, spices and sauces etc.

Subsequently they all deserve their own deserving name.

The result is an endless amount of names for noodle types of food!

To us it's simple delicious noodles, or lukshen.

Thank Hashem for the delicious lukshen and lukshen kugel!

The shapes, sizes, length....etc don't matter much to us.

It's not something that "carries any weight".

Continued It's nothing of great importance.

Therefore we as Yidden, don't have many words to describe lukshen or אטריות.

Take snow for another example.

The people who live up in the Alps, allegedly have over thirty words to describe the different types of snow!

Snow is a major part of their life, and culture.

Here (in New York) we know it just as "snow, or slush!"

lt's beautiful, calming and relaxing, פלאים, Boruch Hashem, but it's nothing of great significance in our lives to have so many ways to describe snow.

שלג. ברד. כפור .- That's it!

We Yidden however have lots and lots words describing how we can praise Hashem. להודות להלל, לשבח, לברך, לעלה, לברך, לעלה, ולנצח, לברך, לעלה,

And there are much more descriptive "ways to praise" words, to add to that list.

"להקדיש ליוצרם בנחת רוח בשפה ברורה ובנעימה "

"בקדושה ובטהרה בשירה ובזמרה"

"ומעריצים ומקדישים וממליכים"

Every one of those words refer to a certain distinct way of praising Hashem, each one having a unique difference of definition.

They can (and should) be taught, and explained in great detail.

Rabbi Orlofsky (of Yeshiva Ohr Somayach) claims to have sat through a lengthy few hour שיעור, with the topic being, the difference between להודות and להולל!

Check out the vast selection of praise words used in the poetry (פיוטים)of the huge amount of יוצרות in the machzorim of Yomim Tovim and Yomim Noraim.

Then the tremendous amount of praise words throughout תנ"ך! Including:

שירת הים

שירת הבאר

שירת האזינו

שירת חנה

שירת דבורה

מכתב לחזקיהו

Of course, you'll especially find that throughout the sefer Tehillim!

Praising Hashem is a major part of the Jewish life and culture.

We are constantly looking for a chance to say something good about Hashem.

Same is true for hoping and praying.

We are waiting for a chance to use some words of hope and prayers to Hashem.

The more the better.

The more the merrier.

We love it.



I joined together with R' Yossi Hecht, founder of "ASHER TO THE YATZAR", and we began Bezras Hashem a monthly leaflet to help people understand what this beracha is all about and thus say it with more feeling and *kavanah*. May the *chizuk* from this column bring a *refuah sheleimah* to my daughter (Esther bas Sara Miriam), to R' Yossi Hecht (Yosef Chaim ben Devorah Leah), and to all the *cholim* in *Klal Yisroel*.

A Dose of Chizuk

A man came huffing and puffing into the telegraph office of Western Union. "I need to send an urgent telegram to my family," he managed to say. "No problem," answered the clerk, "please write down your message." The man picked up a pen and wrote: "ATE LUNCH. FOOD DIGESTED. USED FACILITIES. OK. THANK G-D." The clerk looked up in surprise. "Excuse me sir for meddling, but what is so amazing about the fact that you were able to use the facilities?" "Young man," he answered, "if you knew how many things could go wrong from the moment you put food into your mouth until the waste is expelled, you would be terrified each time you ate!"

The aforementioned parable was said by the Mashgiach of Mir, Rav Yerucham Levovitz. Anyone who has experienced any type of difficulty with digestion or expelling body wastes understands this quite well. If we would stop and contemplate this for a moment, we would realize that the only reason we can lead normal lives is because Hashem created our bodies with tremendous wisdom. Just think about how much human brainpower is invested by aircraft designers, aeronautical engineers, and avionics specialists when creating an airplane. Not only that, entire teams of technicians constantly check over its computer systems, engines, landing gear, wings and more. If even one detail is slightly off, they will not fly that plane until it has been fixed. So how do our bodies run so efficiently, even though the smallest disorder can throw us into disarray with various pains, symptoms and dysfunction? It must be that the Master Designer has crafted and fashioned us with infinite wisdom!

It is not surprising, therefore, that Chazal instituted the special *berachah* of Asher Yatzar for us to recite after we use the facilities in order to thank Hashem for the constant kindness of a normal healthy functioning body, and specifically, our digestive system.

So why is it that many people mumble the words of Asher Yatzar while they are "off and running," giving nary a thought to what they are saying? It is probably because they take their good health for granted. If we turn off our auto-pilot mode before we say Asher Yatzar, and put effort into learning what it means, we will see Bezras Hashem, great changes in the way we say this *berachalt*!

In order to help us say Asher Yatzar properly and with feeling, let us think briefly about the kindness of a healthy body before saying the *berachah*. Try choosing a different aspect of our health each time.





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Bitachon Perspective

Q. On A life with Bitachon we say that our mesorah is not to be concerned about ayin Harah, and usually it's just a distraction. However, I know of Gedolim who did take ayin harah seriously. So, how can we say definitively that our mesorah is not to be concerned?

A. All the Gedolim are of the opinion that a person's avodas Hashem must be healthy and wholesome. The ones who were concerned over ayin harah did so because that was their derech in achieving shleimus. And they knew that it wouldn't negatively affect them.

However, ayin harah is a complex matter, and without knowing how it works, it could just turn into a source of anxiety. A person will try to take precautions without limit to avoid it. Whenever something bad happens he'll attribute it to ayin harah, and ultimately, it will bring him further away from Hashem.

Therefore, for the המון עם, although they should be conscientious not to use Hashem's chessed to cause tza'ar to others, beyond that, they should ignore the whole parshah, and trust that Hashem will protect them

Q. I am a therapist. When clients come for therapy, they expect to receive typical therapy; helping them understand their issues, receiving validation over the way they feel etc.

However, I follow the yesodos of A life With Bitachon, and I recognize that the true way to navigate life's struggles and interpersonal issues is by taking people out the picture and putting Hakadosh Baruch Hu there instead, and by understanding that everything Hashem does is for our good.

Should I endeavor to enlighten my clients by introducing them to the yesodos of A life With Bitachon, or should I simply practice conventional therapy?

A. You can definitely try to open them to the world of emunah and bitachon. If they show interest in opening their eyes to the presence of Hashem in their lives, and they feel that this approach is helping them, certainly you could solve their issues in this manner. Improving their relationship with Hashem would be a service to them of the greatest kind.

However, if your client does not want to grow in emunah and bitachon, rather all he's interested in is a listening ear, in that case your job is to do your best to help him using the methods of standard therapy.

Remember, our job is not to change the world. We are here to change ourselves and do exercises in helping others to the best of our abilities.

Q. Ever since I started following the yesodos of A Life With Bitachon, my avodas Hashem and menuchas hanefesh have improved tremendously.

However, when I share these yesodos with my husband, he doesn't share my enthusiasm. He refuses to accept what I tell him, and criticizes the whole approach. When that happens, I start losing my enthusiasm and I begin having second-thoughts about the mehalach.

I'm growing so much from the hotline. Why does Hashem allow my husband to obstruct my growth, and plant doubts in my heart?

A. When a person is confronted with doubts if he is going on the right derech in his avodas Hashem, he should consult with his inner compass: 'do I feel that this track is bringing me closer to Hashem, or is it taking me further away?' 'Am I becoming a happier and healthier person or not?'

Each person has to determine independently. A path which is harmful for one person, may prove to be imperative for the next.

Therefore, when your husband shows a lack of appreciation for the approach we present, that's because he feels that it's not for

him. And that's per-

fectly fine.

However, if you know that you are gaining from the perspective presented in a life with bitachon, it would be a mistake to give it up merely because your husband doesn't recognize its value.

Why is Hashem making it that you're not receiving encouragement from your husband?

Rav Avigdor Miller explains, if serving Hashem would come too easily or if a person would receive plenty of encouragement, his avodas Hashem wouldn't be so valuable because it comes effortlessly.

Therefore, sometimes, even when a person is on the right track, Hashem will send people to cause him to begin doubting his derech.

However, Hashem does not want the person to become discouraged. Sometimes, it's merely meant as a test: will he allow himself to remain unsure of his derech, or will he persevere until he concludes if this is the right derech for him.

Naturally, you should not invite opposition upon yourself. Therefore, if you see that your husband does not react positively when you try to 'enlighten' him with the yesodos of A Life With Bitachon, you should not bring them under discussion. Rather, you should

work on them alone or with like-minded friends.

Q. I was considering moving to a certain city, and I asked several friends about the frum community in that city. They all said that it's a wonderful place and that I would gain a lot by living there. Based on their reports I moved there. However, it didn't take too long until I realized that the standards of the community are not as high as my family's standards. I realized that not only will I not be gaining there, I might even be pulled down.

I consulted with my Rov to ask if I should move back, but he recommended against it. He told me, "At this moment this is where you are. In the meantime, you should stay." Now, I'm upset at the friends who misguided me into moving there. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. What's bothering you? You are thinking, "My aspiration is to grow in my avodas Hashem. All because my friends gave me poor advice, here I am, stuck in a 'bedieved' community."

You have to understand; human beings cannot affect you in any way. Hakadosh Baruch Hu is the One who is running every last detail of your life. With Hakadosh Baruch Hu there is

no such thing as 'bedieved'. If this is where you find yourself, that's because this is where you are supposed to be.

Each person came down to this world to accomplish the mission that Hashem has planned out for them. We might be confident that our future lies in a certain area; however, Hashem might have a very different thing in mind for us.

You may have thought that at this point in your life your mission is to focus inwards on self-improvement. Hashem, on the other hand, may want from you to focus outwards.

Perhaps the reason that Hashem made you land up in an environment which is not on your level is so you can be mashpia to others.

When you understand that you were sent to that community because that is where you need to be at this point in your life, you won't have any hard feelings towards the people who 'misguided' you.

On the contrary; you will be grateful to them for leading you into the place where you can fulfill your true tikkun haneshama.
