



SIXTY SECONDS OF INSPIRATION

In his introduction to Sefer Shemiras HaLoshon, the Chofetz Chaim explains how Dovid HaMelech can make such a grandiose promise when he

states, "Mi ho'ish hechofetz chaim oheiv Yomim ler'os tov, netzor leshon'cho Meira usfosecho midaber mirmo," "Who is the person who wants eternal life in the Next World and wants to experience goodness of this world? Guard your mouth

from speaking badly about other people."

Now how can that single discipline be

such a difference-maker in this world and the next?

The Chofetz Chaim explains that if a



person will be careful not to harm another person even with words, he will certainly not hurt others materially. And it will be the cause that he thinks about other people in a more positive light.

And that will show up in every relationship. It's the key to a blessed existence.

Gut Shabbos!



Let's focus on the position of our teeth.

The teeth that are in the front of our mouth do the job of cutting and the teeth that are in

the back of our mouth do the job of crushing.

This clearly shows us chochmas Hashem. When we initially put the food into our mouth, we need the cutting teeth to cut up our food. Afterwards, when the food is in the back of our mouth, we need the molars to crush the food. If our cutting teeth would be in the back of our mouth how would we bite off a piece of falafel or a piece of a sandwich? How would we get the food to the back of the mouth?

R' Avigdor Miller Zt"l related that he once asked a dentist that in the many thousands of mouths that he looked into, did he ever see the position reversed – with the molars in the front center. The dentist said "No, but what is your point?"

R' Avigdor Miller answered in shock, "Don't you see Hashem's design staring at you in the face?" Every person has the stamp of Hashem's chochmah and chessed right inside his mouth. We have six teeth that do the job of cutting.

To be more specific, when we zero in on these six teeth, there are actually two different types of teeth there.

In the center of the mouth, there are four cutting teeth and there is an additional tooth on each side of these four teeth. They have a different shape than the other teeth. As opposed to the other teeth that are flat at the edge – they are pointy at the edge. If this is something that you were not aware of until now, feel free to check it out now – with your finger or with a mirror.

Hashem gave us these teeth with a special job, to tear and rip. This is similar to cutting, which the other four teeth do, but it is a little bit of a different action. The reason that we have different types of teeth is because they have different jobs to do.

Our molars that crush, Hashem also created them differently from each other. There are larger molars in the back of the mouth and smaller ones in the front. Our mouth contains various different tools that play different roles in helping us eat our food.

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Chazal tell us that there are four areas that need substantial chizzuk, and one of them is "Tefilla".

Reb Chaim Epstein zt"l used to say that he would constantly hear people talking about "shteiging in Torah". However, with regards to Tefilla he never heard people talking about "shteiging in Tefilla". Reb Chaim concludes that this is a fundamental error.

Yes, we can shteig in Tefilla as well and this is what we will be discussing now.

Let's start of by understanding that the way we value Tefilla will affect our relationship with Tefilla. We need to retain the awesome value of Tefilla. Let me give some examples.

One can go to an art museum and look at the priceless paintings and make a comment like "pretty nice" and move on. However, another person that studied and understands the value of paintings will analyze all the intricate details and marvel at



the skill and beauty. He will have a greater appreciation for those priceless paintings.

Some people can pass by a plant or tree and will not really understand what they are looking at. Obviously, they understand that they are looking at a plant or tree, but it's without depth. Someone that studied the chochma behind plants and trees will see all the intricacies and brilliance that Hashem put into it.

I remember as kid walking with my grandmother Devorah bas Reb Dovid Dov zt"l. Many a time when she would be walking through the streets, she would suddenly freeze and she would be transfixed. I would ask her what she was looking at.

She would start explaining to me different amazing things that she noticed with the trees, the leaves and the birds. She would always emphasize



that from all this we can see glimpses of Hashem's wisdom.

When it comes to Tefilla it's no different. After all we do Daven the same davening each day. If we want to be impressed with Tefilla and realize how precious every word of Tefilla really is we need to get to work. Once we realize what a gem Tefilla is this will help us shteig in Tefilla with Hashem's help.

Let's discuss some ideas how we can be mechazek our Tefilla with the fundamental concept of Hachana - preparation.

The first thing is to make sure we have a real and healthy relationship with Hashem.

When we feel His love and kindness, we will feel drawn to him and have a desire to thank Him and talk to Him.

The more we live with Hashem throughout the day, the better our tefillos will be.

Another idea which is not limited to Tefilla, is to learn the halachos pertaining Tefilla. The more we learn the halachos the more value and chashivus we will get for Tefilla. Obviously, we need to know the Halachos to know what to do, but it will give us a chashivus as well.


This is not limited to Tefilla. If we want to be Mechazek ourselves in Shemiras halashon, we should learn the Halachos Shemiras Halashon.

If one needs chizzuk in the area of Kibbud Av va'em, he should learn the halachos [recently an amazing book came out in English].

It's the same with Tefilla. It's true that Hilchos Tefilla is a huge subject, the good news is that there are amazing Seforim in Hebrew and English. This will give us an appreciation for Tefilla.

There is another way to give us a deeper appreciation for Tefilla and that's called "peirush ha'milos". On a basic level to learn the translation of the words, and Baruch Hashem there are plenty of amazing siddurim that have translations.

However, it goes even deeper

than that. We can study the Tefilla with depth. There are books and Seforim that delve into the Tefilos in Hebrew and in English. [one example is Tallelai oros]. This will give us a whole new dimension to our Tefilla.

There are fascinating Shiurim in all languages as well [for example Rev Schlesinger and Rabbi Eli Oelbaum and much more].

All this will give us a stronger connection to Tefilla. This will give us a stronger connection to Hashem, as our Tefilla will have more meaning, and our feelings will be stronger as well.

I once heard a nice mashal to understand our connection regarding to tefilla, and that's the cell phone. One can call someone from his cell phone to his neighbor next door. However, he can lose connection, because he is in a basement. But once he goes upstairs he can call Eretz Yisroel which is approximately six thousand miles away.

How do we understand this? The answer is that in order to



make the phone call we need to be connected to the satellite. So too in regard to Tefilla. If we want our Tefillos to soar to the heavens we need to be connected. How? Through our preparations.

Another important area of preparation is with regard to preparing our body for davening. This includes a guf naki, washing one's hands as stated clearly in halacha, and some go to the mikva. These activities, and more, truly help us connect to Hashem when we daven. I heard an amazing story about someone who took it upon himself to always wash his hands before davening. One time he was at a [kosher] beach in Eretz Yisroel, and it came time for Mincha. He couldn't find a sink with which to wash his hands, so he went down to the water - just in time to find someone drowning!

One of the many benefits that we will have, once we are focused on our Tefillos, is that we will start to notice that we are endlessly davening for Moshiach. This will help us be "Metzape l'yeshua" as we will start pouring out our hearts for Moshiach.

Whether it's throughout Pesukeu dezimra, Shemonei Esrei and throughout our days. If we will be yearning throughout the day then we can be sure that Hashem will answer our Tefillos of "v'sechezena eineinu bishuvcha letziyon birachamim Amein.

They're really a great bunch of amazing people.

Add to that their friendly nature, that really makes them truly amazing!

He answered, "The type of timer that was installed was not meant to handle the amount of electricity that was being used by all those lights.

The one that I installed now, can handle it".

At the time my cousin had installed the timer, I wasn't using that much electricity for the lights.

I later on added to the amount of lights being used.

Subsequently the timer couldn't handle it and it burnt-out.

So back to the mysterious mathematical equation riddle.



Thank Him Right Away!

It happened clear out of the blue. Fishel was innocently walking down the street when he suddenly felt strong cramps in his stomach. The pain was so strong that he had to sit down on the nearest bench, and wait for it to pass. When this kept happening, he went to the emergency room and was sent for a series of tests. The results were not long in coming and a doctor informed Fishel and his wife that he had a serious condition which required emergency surgery. "Oy vey!" proclaimed Fishel. "We have no insurance; how can we afford the surgery?" "Don't worry," answered his wife. "Don't you remember that your cousin Chaim Brown is the world's top surgeon in this field? Let's speak to him!" When Dr. Brown heard about Fishel's situation, he immediately arranged the surgery and performed it at no cost, with the utmost care and concern.

Baruch Hashem, the surgery was extremely successful surgery, and they moved Fishel to the recovery room. When he opened his eyes, he saw Dr. Brown waiting patiently for him to wake up. But then he noticed that his good friend Yankel was also sitting there. "Yankel," he called out, "it was so nice of you to come visit me! So, tell me, how did you get here, was it -". "Fishel, what's with you!" interrupted his wife. "Dr. Brown, who did so much for you, is sitting right here! Shouldn't you thank him before you schmooze with your friend?"

Rav Dov Kook of Tiveria (in his sefer Berumo Shel Olam, page 5) gives the aforementioned parable to explain why, even if it is permissible to wait before saying Asher Yatzar, doing so would be similar to acting like foolish Fishel. Each time we place food in our bodies, our lives are in danger. As we say in the *beracha: "Im yipaseiach echod meihem, o yisaseim echod meihem, e efshar le'hiskayem v'lamod lefanceha (afilu sha'ah echas- nusach sfard) -* if but one of them (the openings or cavities) were to be ruptured or but one of them were to be blocked, it would be impossible to survive and to stand before you (for even one moment)!" Hakadosh Baruch, in His great kindness, is the Master Doctor and makes sure that nothing gets stuck. The nutrients are extracted from the food, and the waste is expelled safely. All this is done free of charge and painlessly, by our loving caring Father in Heaven, without us even knowing what is going on inside our body. So, doesn't it make sense to say Asher Yatzar immediately after using the facilities? Furthermore, if we bear this in mind, we will really feel that we are thanking Hashem, and not merely fulfilling a halachic obligation.

----- Internalize It! ------

After we use the facilities, let us take a moment to internalize the fact that Hashem is our doctor and just performed a great operation for us. Let us then say the beracha with true feelings of gratitude!

When we learn Torah and observe its precepts, we become the vehicles through which Hashem's existence and honor are revealed to the entire world.

Our mission of kiddush Hashem is pivotal to the existence of the world itself. Rashi (Bereishis 1:1) quotes Chazal, who state that the world was created "bishvil Yisrael shenikre'u reishis — for the sake of the Jewish people, who are called 'the first.'"We generally understand this to mean that everything in the world was created to assist us in serving Hashem; however, the Shelah HaKadosh (in his classic tefillah for parents) explains this maamar Chazal to mean precisely the opposite:The Jewish people exist in order to serve the world, not vice versa. Through our service of Hashem, we become the force that brings the entire world to perfection and leads it to achieve its purpose.

Blind Faith:

A "Chance" Encounter That Changed Everything Based on a story told over by Rabbi YY Rubinstein

Benny Rubinstein, a man in his 30s, faced a daunting challenge. He suffered from keratoconus, a serious eye condition that caused his cornea to distort unevenly. With double vision plaguing him, he knew that he might need a cornea transplant before the age of forty. However, there was a ten-year waiting list for such a procedure, and many doctors warned him that it was only a matter of time before he would go blind.

In no time the house came to them on a silver platter, exactly the price that they wanted, without going to any bidding war.


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This story has been called in by a Choshuve Yungerman by the name of Mishpachas Heller. He said that his

Bitachon Perspective

Q. I did an aveira, and I feel very bad about myself. I have very little motivation to continue trying to be the big tzaddik I wish to be. What's the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

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R'ZEVY GOLOMBE

A. Be a businessman. When a businessman makes a bad investment, does he throw away the rest of his money?! Of course not! He tries to minimize the losses and make the current situation as profitable as he can. You can do this too. Take your post-mistake situation and cash in. Here are some examples of new opportunities you now have:

• You have the opportunity to be strong and not give up. When you continue working on growing even though it's hard, the results penetrate deeper.

• You're exercising the muscle of not being thrown off balance in hard times. This is the way to become great: by getting up after a fall. As it states שבע יפול .

• Now you have a wonderful opportunity to realize that you're not the Mr. Perfect you thought you were.

• Take this opportunity to be on guard in the future and avoid this mistake or worse.

Q. Whenever I do something wrong, I find it very hard to do teshuva, because the more I dwell on my aveira the worse I feel about myself, and the less motivated I am to continue trying.

A. Generally, the time to work on teshuva is not immediately after you do that aveira. In order to do a proper teshuva, or to work on any area of improvement, you have to be very healthy emotionally.

Right after you do something wrong, oftentimes, the first thing you need to do is to do CPR on your self-image. Think about all your ma'alos. Think about your accomplishments. As far as the mistake? Big deal. Is this the first time you made a mistake? Think about how you're going to look at yourself in a few weeks from now, after this episode is forgotten, and you've done a lot of good things in the meantime.

After you're feeling good about yourself you can go back and try to think about how you could do better in the future. What about חרטה? If you have חרטה for a few moments, that is enough. After that you shouldn't think about the aveira anymore.

Q. I succumbed to a Yetzer Harah shmiras einayim, and now I feel very disappoint-

ed with myself. What is the right attitude to have?

A. A man wrote a letter to the Steipler complaining that he constantly is nichshol in inyanei kedusha.

The Steipler wrote to him that he shouldn't focus on the numerous times he was nichshol, rather on the times he overcame.

If mitzvos are so important that you get upset when you slip up, they have to be important enough that you should take great pride when you fulfill them.

If you would take into consideration all the times you were omeid b'nisayon, you would be bursting with pride how many times you had such heroic self-control.

Q. I had an elderly father who required a lot of medical attention. Although I invested effort in trying to give my father the proper care and finding him good doctors, his situation deteriorated, and eventually he passed away.

Now, I'm overcome with feelings of guilt; perhaps I could have invested much more energy in finding him the top doctors and he could have been ma'arich yamim

What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. Almost the identical episode happened with Maran Rav Baruch Ber Leibowitz ZY"A.

When Rav Baruch Ber's father, Reb Shmuel, was ill, Rav Baruch Ber stood by his bedside and attended to his needs day and night.

Rav Baruch Ber was beside himself with grief. He said that he was responsible for his father's petirah because he failed to take proper care of him.

Rav Baruch Ber was so distraught, that it took a toll on his physical health, and it got to the point that he was unable to give his Gemara shiur.

The Chofetz Chayim heard what had happened and sent a message that he wanted to see Rav Baruch Ber. Rav Baruch Ber traveled to Radin, and went into the Chofetz Chaim. The Chofetz Chaim held Rav Baruch Ber's hand for a halfan-hour and talked about the power of teshuva. The Chofetz Chaim explained that teshuva is not merely achieving forgiveness. Teshuva transforms you into a new person!

Rav Baruch Ber internalized the words of the Chofetz Chaim, and was infused with a new spirit. Rav Baruch Ber exclaimed, 'I'm a new person! 'I'm a new person!'.

And it was this message that gave Rav Baruch Ber chizuk to continue giving shiurim and to move forward in life.

Another story: Rav Michel Feinstien [son-in-law of the Brisker Rav] had a daughter who had asthma. Whenever she got an asthma attack, her breathing had to be regulated by means of an inhaler. To this end, Rav Michel made sure to have numerous inhalers next to her at all times.

Once, she had an attack, but Rav Michel couldn't find any of the inhalers. The attack worsened, and after a few minutes she was nifteres. Shortly after, he discovered three inhalers right next her bed!

One of the days of shiva, Rav Yankel Galinsky came to be menachem avel, and he saw that Rav Michel was very broken. Rav Michel said, 'if only, I would have been more organized with the inhalers I could've saved my daughter's life'.

When Reb Yankel heard this, he countered, 'your daughter's petirah has nothing to do with you. Even if you would've had everything prepared, she would have passed away because her time came'.

After Reb Yankel Galinsky left the shiva house, Reb Michel remarked, 'of all the people who offered consolation, Reb Yankel succeeded in truly comforting me'.

We see from these gedolei yisroel what is da'as Torah's approach to such situations. Even if a person feels that he could have done more, there is no reason to fall apart. With teshuva he is transformed into a new person. And about the fact the he could have prolonged the life of the niftar, he should know that if the person passed away, it's because his time came and nothing could've prevented it.
