ear, nose and throat specialist, who would check him with a special, expensive machine that can be found only in hospitals. This machine shows an accurate display of the vocal cords while a person is speaking.

The results were not encouraging. There was a polyp sitting on his vocal cords, preventing them from

closing properly while he was speaking.

"The only way to get rid of such a polyp," the doctor told him, "is through surgery. Do you want to have the surgery done now, or wait another half a year and then see what the situation is?" The husband said he can't afford that much. He said he understood it was their right to raise the rent, but he would then have to move away. The owner asked if he learned three sedarim a day. You are coming to the beis medrash to spend four hours immersed in learning, in order to create a kiddush Hashem. If you spend the five-minute drive to the yeshivah acting in a way that is not befitting a ben Torah — if you honk your horn rudely, cut off other drivers, tailgate, and act in other disrespectful or impolite ways — you will be doing the exact opposite of kiddush Hashem. Those five minutes could negate the effect of the next four hours of learning!"

Rabbi Yehuda Gross* lives in Lakewood, New Jersey. One Friday afternoon, which was Erev Succos, Rabbi Gross got into his car to bring some food to a friend who had just had a baby boy, in honor of the Shalom Zachor. By the time he started to drive home, there was only one hour left to Yom Tov. Without realizing it, Rabbi Gross began to drive more quickly. As he drove down Miller Road, he suddenly heard a siren. He looked into his mirror and saw flashing lights. A policeman on a motorcycle motioned to him to pull over.

Rabbi Gross pulled over to the side of the road and opened his window.

"What's your hurry?" the policeman asked him roughly.

"The Sabbath is coming soon; I'm sorry if I was driving too quickly," Rabbi Gross answered.

"Well, if you don't drive safely, you might never make it home!" the policeman shouted back. "Give me your license and registration."

Rabbi Gross handed over the papers. The policeman continued to explain what Rabbi Gross had done wrong. "Do you realize that what you were doing is dangerous? There are many cars driving, people walking, and children on bicycles. You must drive slowly and carefully, so that everyone will be safe. Being in a hurry is no excuse."

Rabbi Gross understood. He apologized again, but the policeman did not seem any happier. He walked back to his motorcycle. A few minutes later, he came back to Rabbi Gross's car. Rabbi Gross was sure the policeman would give him a ticket. Instead, he said with a smile, "I'll let you go for today. Just be sure to drive safely from now on."

Rabbi Gross was totally confused. "Thank you very much, officer. May I ask why you are doing this favor for me?"

"Actually, I am in a very good mood today," the policeman answered. "I just got a blessing from Rabbi Salomon. I feel so good about that blessing, that I decided I will let you go and not give you a ticket."

the piano, has to practice scales. Those add up to songs, and then more so-so-phisticated songs. When that person who's been practicing the piano becomes an adult, and they want to ex-




press themselves musically, their fingers know exactly what to do.

Living With Mpprectation By: R' Daniel Shasha

Although Moshe carried out most of the plagues, he didn't carry out the first three: blood, frogs, and lice. Why was this so?

Many years earlier when Moshe was born, he was miraculously saved by being placed in a basket that floated on the river. Water helped save his life and he had so much gratitude that he just couldn't bring himself to hit the river in order to bring these plagues. Also, when he was growing up in Pharoah's palace and killed an Egyptian taskmaster for his cruel treatment of his fellow Jew, he used the earth to bury him. Out of gratitude to the earth, he just couldn't hit it to bring the plague of lice. Therefore, Aharon caried out these plagues instead. (Midrash Tanchumah)

Yet there is an obvious question. Water and earth don't have feelings. Surely, they wouldn't have felt slighted if Moshe carried out these plagues? Why did He consider it to be a lack of gratitude if he hit them? Rav Dessler answers with something powerful. He explains that the reason Moshe didn't carry them out, wasn't because these objects will be offended. Rather, it was due to any harm that he might cause to his own character. Since he benefited from them, he didn't want to harm them as a way of strengthening his personal feelings of appreciation.

Showing gratitude to objects that helps us is a great way of strengthening our trait of gratitude. Even though they don't have feelings it makes a great impact on ourselves and helps accustom ourselves to this quality. Consequently, helping us appreciate the good we receive from others and from Hashem.

Rav Matisyahu Solomon zatzal asks a fascinating question on this Chazal. It was shortly discovered that Moshe killed the Egyptian man and he had to flee for his life and escape to Midian. Therefore, how useful was the earth in burying him after all? Rav Matisyahu explains, that even though it was only a short while until it was discovered, Moshe still needed to show appreciation for those few moments of security the earth helped provide! We see how far the obligation of hakaras hatov goes. We need to show appreciation for even a small amount of benefit that we receive.


Rabbi Yisrael Zev Gustman, the late Rosh Yeshiva of Netzach Yisrael, maintained the practice of regularly watering the plants and trees outside his Yeshivah. He always insisted on doing this himself and never allowed any of his talmidim to assist him. Rav Gustman once explained the reason behind this practice. In his younger years his Rebbi, Rabbi Chaim Ozer Grodinsky, taught him which plants in the forest were edible and which ones were poisonous. At the time he didn't understand why this was necessary, but years later when he was fleeing



from the Germans hiding in the forest, the advice came very handy. There was no food available yet he was able to survive by eating the edible plants. Out of gratitude to the plants

which helped sustain him throughout those difficult years, he took upon himself to personally water them each day!

Again and again – the greatest human who ever crossed the planet earth is told by

הקב"ה to do something and says, "He can't"!

He will soon become the greatest success in the history of mankind and he will raise the level of אמונה ובטחון for all of us forever since he will cause יציאת, and look how he appears so incapable and so י"ו lacking in אמונה and trust in .!

Part IV

And the holy Torah wants us to keep hearing again and again about what appears in our small אמובה ובטחון ח"ו as a וחסרון as a חסרון ה"ו and a חסרון in self esteem! דוקא this person remains our greatest example to follow and we are מחוייב to believe in his greatness as basic in our yiddishkeit.

Part V

We can suggest בס"ד that the תורה wants us to see how many frustrat-

ing and unending difficulties a person can have in עבודת ד'. And the lesson for all those nervous types and depressive and hopeless cases in קדושה or קדושה or קדושה or facing the world and דיבוי הרבים etc. – if you are having extreme difficulties, maybe you are the future משה רבינו of our יו!!

– then the תורה is telling us a message that needs to be repeated!

Part VIII

If you don't constantly remind yourself – either by reading this again and again or opening a חוחזר and aning this story a lot (or both), then you won't get too far. This is called לימוד המוסר –

when you keep repeating something that you know already—since it takes plenty of repetition to sink in.

He walks around all day being too well aware of his shortcomings. He was told that for him תיקון המדות is believing he's good, and that he did the right thing no matter what!

One morning, he woke up late and he needed to go to B.M.G. to give an important letter to a yungerman. The yungerman told him that he would be in B.M.G. until 8:30. At 8:25 Chaim was rushing out of the house when his wife

needed some help. Part III

He felt "zero" inside and what he was saying made no sense to him at all, but his חינוך in positive lies had already become part of him.

A second later, a car passed by him with the yungerman waving to him – and he opened his car window and passed him the letter!


Part VI

This story is an absolute goldmine and I have to give this type of message to many people. My rabbeim (albeit from a different generation) have encouraged me in insisting to promote this way of thinking since this is called the true שבירת המדות.

This Week's Gadol: Rav Belsky BY: Y.W.

Rav Belsky was the Rosh yeshivah of Yeshivah Torah Vada'as. He had so much care for every Yid. Here is one story out of the many that illustrate his love towards his fellow Yidden.

One day, when Rav Belsky was at Niagara Falls with his talmidim, he wanted to go into the Niagara cave with them. However, the security guard said, "Sorry, not all these boys may go in." He pointed at a boy in a wheelchair. "That boy will have to stay behind, while the rest of you can go in."



Suddenly, he saw a father standing nearby, picking up his child and placing him on his shoulders. Rav Belsky's eyes lit up. He could do the same thing! He called to the security guard, "Excuse me, can I bring this boy on my shoulders as well?" pointing to the boy in the wheelchair.

The guard thought it would be way too heavy for him! But Rav Belsky just picked him up and brought him into the cave. He acted as any father would to his own son, because to him, his talmidim really were his children.



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We have been discussing the great subject of loving other Yidden and doing chessed. We will b'ezras Hashem continue on our journey with many refreshing thoughts and outlooks. Let's explore.

I heard an unbelievable story from Rav Avraham Schorr Shlit"a. There was once a Chassid of a great Rebbe who did the Rebbe a tre-

mendous favor with great mesiras nefesh. The Rebbe was understandably full of gratitude.

The Rebbe wanted to reward and give him a bracha. He interestingly gave his chassid two options. Either he will be guaranteed a place in the world to come or he will give him a Bracha for great riches. To everyone's shock and amazement the chassid chose the latter - to become rich.

The Chassidim were baffled because this chassid had very little to do with olam hazeh. So, they respectfully approached him and asked him for an explanation.

The Chassid responded with the most remarkable explanation. He explained that obviously his first impulse was to grab the first choice, to be guaranteed a portion in the next world, and not just a regular portion. To be with the Rebbe, what could be better than that?

However, after some serious thought he realized that this decision was coming from a selfish point of view. On the other hand, he realized that if he gets all that riches he will be able to spend the rest of his life helping other people. With this thought he made his decision.

This story has much depth to it and we can devote quite a few pages analyzing this amazing story. However, let's bring out from this story the famous words of Rav Yisroel Salanter who writes "that the reason we are in this world is to do for others".

This man understood this and that's



why he felt that instead of taking a short-cut to Gan Eden, he went the right way. He understood the greatness of doing for others, whether it's Tzedaka or chessed. This is our mission.

Perhaps this is why the Avos were given much richness, to be able to do their mission to the fullest of doing chessed for others.

Now someone reading this may be thinking as follows. "I am not wealthy as I struggle to pay my bills, so all this is irrelevant to me."

There is a story about Rav Yisroel Salanter himself. We know that Rav Yisroel Salanter fathered the idea of Kollelelim that is surging all over the world until today.

Once, his Talmidim saw him talking passionately to an elderly man about the chashivus of learning in Kollel. This man was not a person of means (monetarily) nor was he able to join the Kollel. So they asked their Rebbe why was he spending time with this old man.

Rav Yisroel replied, "It's true that he can't come to the Kollel nor can he give much, but he needs to want to participate both physically and monetarily."

This idea is very refreshing to me.

If you were to win the mega million power ball [e.g. two hundred million] what would you do with your money?

There will be a tiny percentage of the world (under one percent) who will respond immediately that they will

give lots of tzeddaka to all different organizations.

Some will say that they will start their own organizations, Kolelim or Yeshivos.

There will be all sorts of creativity in promoting more chessed and Torah to the world. Many Yidden would donate sifrei Torah and build Shuls.

I once heard a good line from a Yid. He said that if the non-Jews would know about all the



chessed organizations that we Yidden have, it would be enough of an incentive to convert.

Now it's true that fantasizing for selfish reasons may be a waste of time. However, if one fantasizes in striking it rich to be able to grow by leaps and bounds in chessed and supporting Torah, then it is in fact commendable. This is what Reb Yisroel Salanter is teaching us.

When the Ponevezeh Rosh Yeshiva was looking to build Yeshivos someone made a comment to him that "he is dreaming." Not missing a beat, the Rav responded, "Yes that is correct, but the difference is that you dream by night while I dream by day."

Perhaps if we keep fantasizing how we can do loads of chessed, perhaps Hashem will make our dreams come true. Hashem has unlimited resources to help us achieve our goals.

Now we know that in our communities there are tremendous chessed organizations that are dedicated to Klal Yisroel 24/7. For example: Hatzalah. Another name for Hatzalah

is EMT. I believe that this name fits them perfectly. Energy, Money and Time. Let's discuss them.

Energy- The speed and work that goes into saving peoples' lives is mind boggling. One can even see a middle age man running trying to save another life. The devotion that members have are incredible.

Money - Many times a Hatzalah member will be in the middle of a business meeting and he has to drop everything to rush to a scene.

I heard a story of a man that walked into a shop, and he was looking around. All of a sudden, the owner rushed over to him and asked him if he wants to watch the store or come back a different time as he sped off to try saving another Jewish soul.

Time - This is something which makes Hatzalah so incredible. They give up their sleep, their suppers, their lunches, their conversations and even their Shabbos meals.

There are not enough words to describe the sacrifices that go into the lives of Hatzalah members, and we cannot forget their wives. The fact that they allow their husbands to run out is a tremendous sacrifice on their end.

"Give It In", vs. "Give In".

"Give It Up", vs. "Give Up".

"I'm giving it in," is usually used in terms to giving in something to someone (office files, applications, record sheets, etc.) The term "giving in," without explaining or stating what exactly you're giving in, changes the meaning. It is usually used in the context of: giving in on my own opinion or view of something, to someone else's way of doing or thinking or to their request.

The words, "I'm giving it up" are commonly used in terms of: giving up a certain habit, practice, routine, addiction, etc. It can sound pretty positive.

On the other hand, the words "I give up," does not give us any hint of a constructive or positive feeling of "going forward" in life. It seems to mean: "I give myself up, to something or someone stronger than myself." I surrender to some mighty force, task or person.

We can perhaps change that to sound hopeful, motivated, and then eventually, even content!



When I'm about to say those words, "I give up" I can start thinking: Yes! I give myself up to The Almighty Hashem! I give up my struggling in pursuing the illusionary needs in my life. 'I GIVE UP TO HASHEM'!

I give myself: my own differed thought, wants and needs up to Hashem! To His Will, to His Ratzon, and to His way of running His world. He knows best, and does the best, for everyone!

Who am I to have an opinion? My mindset stems from a mind that is

bound by the boundaries of the created human. It is a very limited, narrow way of thinking. It just causes me frustration when I don't "get my way".

Giving myself up to Hashem, will only bring me peace of mind, and peace with the situation that I find myself in, because in essence, this is Hashem's

I won't say: Hashem, I give up. Rather, I give up **to** Hashem! My will will be His Will.

עשה רצונך כרצונו Make your will, His Will! As the famous quote from the Chovas Halevavos about the righteous person who was known to say, "I never woke up in the morning, wanting to be in a different circumstance, than what Hashem put me in now!" That way we can thank Hashem for EVERYTHING going on in the world and in our personal lives.

In any situation we find ourselves, under all conditions, circumstance, or happenstance, we can choose to say: This is what HASHEM wants and it's happening the way He wants it to happened. It's all with the exact timing and setting including everything and everyone that's involved, with all the minute details.



There is a good purpose for me to be in this situation that I find myself in now. Let me take advantage of it and do the best I can, to live up to it's purpose, in the best way possible!

When you'll surrender your will to Hashem's Will, you will always be content and relaxed with serenity and tranquility. You will feel secure in the Hands of Hash-

em. He Is The One Who will only do the best for you, for me, and for everyone, ALWAYS -in all ways!

My father A"H had a saying that he constantly repeated throughout the day, in his aging years.

It goes with a story. A group of Yidden were once traveling in their wagon, on the way to their Rebbe. They noticed a poor man walking on the side of the road, and immediately offered him to join them on their



horse- driven, simple wagon.

The poor man happily hopped aboard and found some empty space on the straw covered floor. He sat down smiling contently. They continued on their way, but the other passengers were concerned if this Yid was comfortable. Was that smile real? They asked him good-heartedly "Reb Yid are you okay? Is that seat good enough?"

This poor, pure, Yid answered

his smilwith ing face,"Ashrei Ha'am Shekocho Loi". He explained a new way of understanding those words. Ashrei Ha'am-"Lucky is the nation, Shekocho- that, the way it is, Loi- is good for him!

A Yid is happy and content with the way things are going in his life, no matter what. So, yes, this soft straw seat, on the floor of the shaking rocking wagon is just fine!"

Upon reaching their destination, the Rebbe in-

quired about their traveling. He kept on asking for more details. Until the talmidim told him about the smiling Yid that they picked up on the way. When they finished retelling his p'shat in that posuk, the Rebbe smiled, "That's what I was waiting to hear." The Rebbe continued, "It was worth your whole long arduous travel just to hear that heilige P'shat in

that verse of Tehillim."

CZAR NIKOLAI'S ARMY would fight during the day and drink at night. One soldier drank too much, and he was still asleep when his troop moved on. Upon awakening, he knew he had to catch up with his battalion quickly, but first, he wanted something to eat. It was Friday night. He came to a Jewish home and helped himself to the pot of steaming cholent.

He mounted his horse, placed the pot of hot cholent on the horse's mane, and set off to find his division. The hot cholent burned the horse's back, which spurred the horse to run quickly. It didn't take long before he reached his battalion, but his horse, burning from the hot pot, kept charging forward straight toward the frontlines.

The enemy soldiers saw him charging full-speed toward them, assuming he surely had a powerful weapon, as he wasn't scared to face them alone. As such, they fled in panic.

In this manner, Czar Nikolai's army won the battle without firing a single gunshot.

Reb Mendel Futerfas, zt"l, told this story and explained that it is the same with our battle against the yetzer hara. If one shows courage and hislahavus, the yetzer hara will be afraid of him and leave him alone.

Reb Yaakov Meir Shechter, shlita, explained the power of "courage" with an analogy: "When you are among a pack of dogs and show them you are afraid, they'll run after you. But if you show them you aren't scared, the dogs will leave you alone."

Reb Yaakov Meir explained that this is also how it is with the yetzer hara. If you show fear and cowardliness, the yetzer hara can overpower you. But if you show confidence and courage, the yetzer hara leaves you alone.

"IT DOESN'T SUIT YOU!"

A bachur from Reb Isser Zalman Meltzer's yeshiva once said an innovative Torah thought. Upon hearing it, Reb Isser Zalman requested that someone bring them mashkeh, and the entire yeshiva drank l'chaim



because of their joy from this bachur's discovery in Torah.

That bachur later admitted that

because of the honor everyone gave him, he studied diligently for an entire half a year afterward!

Chazal say (Sotah 49) that before Moshiach comes, "there will be a lot of chutzpah." The Sefas Emes says that this alludes to people having the chutzpah and audacity to say, "I'm a tzaddik! I'm special!" And yet, thinking that way is necessary because, when said with pride, it can conquer the yetzer hara.

Another story that brings out this exact point: After suffering the tzaros of WWII, a Chassidishe bachur strayed off the path of Yiddishkeit to the point that he was planning to marry a non-Jewish woman, R"l. Many people tried to persuade him with logical arguments not to commit this grave sin, but he ignored their mussar.

With his sweet voice, Reb Gad'l Eizner, zt"l, addressed him by telling him simply: "פאסט'ס נישט" בשור Ei's unfit for a Chassidishe bachur." With just that, he turned him around, and the wedding was called off.

Why did Reb Eizner's rebuke work? Because it was laced with "honor." He had honored the bachur with the title of "Chassidishe ba- Continued on chur," of which

he felt privileged to carry, and that ultimately prevented him from the sin.

The Rambam (Avos 2:13) writes, "אל תהי רשע בפני עצמך" Don't consider yourself a rasha, because if you think lowly about yourself, you won't consider your aveiros severe."

The pasuk in Mishlei says: "Musser Hashem, b'ni, al timaas," While the literal translation is "My son don't disgust yourself," the sefarim teach another way to understand it: "B'ni, you're my son. Make sure to avoid any unbefitting behavior."

Rebbe Shlomo Karliner, zt"l, would say, "The greatest yetzer hara is that we forget that we are a ben Melech, a child of Hashem the King."

THE "KING"

Reb Elimelech Biderman tells a story that shows this lesson.



After WWII, it became clear that the Slonimer Rebbe was killed al kidush Hashem. His chassidim turned to the next in line and asked him to take over the leadership, which he accepted only after much pleading and requesting.

When he was appointed, he told an analogy. "What happens when chess experts are playing together, and in the middle the king piece breaks? How do they continue when there's no king?! They can't just stop the game. So what they do is find a nutshell or a button and replace it with the original king, and use the replacement as the new king.

"So too," said the new Rebbe with great humility, "is the situation that we find ourselves in. We have lost our tzaddik, our leader, and yet at this time we must take whatever replacement there is and use it. The war cannot be surrendered; we must continue."

"This story," says R' Biderman, "serves as an important lesson. We must fight our own battles the same way. Although at times we feel that we are unworthy to stand up to the plate, and we might feel like a nutshell, nevertheless, when there's no 'king' in the game, we must step up and play like the 'king.' We must stand with courage against the war of the

yetzer hara. We must stand up and take the place of the 'king' to serve Hashem properly." (Taken with permission from Mechon Be'er Emunah, Be'er Parashah, Re'eh, p. 8)

THE NOBLE MAN IN PRISON

Reb Yankele Galinsky, zt"l, tells that when he was in a Siberian prison, one of his cell-



mates would awaken in the middle of the night, dress in an army uniform, and march about the room, pretending to give demands to people.

One night, Reb Yankele asked him why he did this. The prisoner was embarrassed; he didn't realize that he was being watched. Reb Yankele promised he wouldn't tell anyone and that he was just curious to know why he was doing this charade.

The prisoner replied, "I was a powerful general in the German army. Hundreds of soldiers were under my command. I don't want to forget my glorious past. I put on my military uniform with all my medals and pretend I'm once again a commander over hundreds of soldiers. This gives me strength to endure the humiliation and affliction we suffer here in this Russian prison."

Reb Yankele would later tell this story to remind us that we Jews are the King's sons and shouldn't forget our glory and pride.

"BETTER THAN THE QUEEN!"

R' Chaim Epstein relays that a person who suffered many misfortunes in his life came to seek consolation from the Skverer Rebbe, R' Yaakov Yosef Twersky. He said that he had been experiencing many troubles in his life to the point that he was feeling downtrodden.

Hearing this the Rebbe said, "A Yid feeling dejected? How can that be! Every morning, a Yid bentches Hashem that 'Shelo asani goy,' that Hashem didn't make him a goy. That means that we praise Hashem that we're more precious than the Queen of England. Isn't that enough reason not to feel down?!"

HASHEM WANTS YOUR MITZVOS

One of the greatest ways—if not the greatest—to build this feeling is by remembering that Hashem adores, venerates, and admires the mitzvos that we do, and every time we withstand and hold ourselves from doing an aveirah, Hashem admires it.

There was once a man who had made a kabbalah to learn from a particular sefer each Shabbos as a zechus for a particular yeshuah that he wanted. He did so for eight consecutive years but didn't see the yeshuah. One week, he realized his kabbalah wasn't working, so he decided he would give up learning from that sefer.

That Shabbos, while he was in shul, an unfamiliar boy came in looking for something. The boy asked him, "Do you know where I can find such-and-such sefer?" After the man helped him find it, the boy asked the man if they would be able to learn together. As they sat down to learn, the man started to cry, eliciting the wonderment of the boy.

The man explained to the boy how he'd been learning the sefer for the past eight years and only gave up on his kabbalah a few days prior. He thought Hashem didn't care about his learning the sefer, because he didn't get the yeshuah after eight years of learning it consistently. And now, by Hashem turning around the world and bringing this unfamiliar boy into the shul seeking a chavrusa to learn this particular sefer, he saw how Hashem really did care about his learning. That is what brought him to tears.

Hashem was showing him that although he hadn't yet been zocheh to the yeshuah, it shouldn't leave him with a feeling that Hashem doesn't value what he's doing. Hashem has His reasons for withholding the yeshuah, but that doesn't take away in any way the value of the mitzvah that he's doing.

Reb Yehoshua Hoffman began his speech by discussing the subject of happiness. The key to happiness, he told his listeners, is to appreciate and be happy with what one has. "Every person has something that I call a 'happy meter," he continued. "A 'happy meter' is a measurement of how much you need to have in order to be happy. This is something very individual. Some people need to have extravagant meals, while others are content with simple foods. Some people are satisfied only when they can enjoy luxuries, while others are content with the bare minimum. We all have happy meters' in every area of our lives, ideas that tell us what to expect from our jobs, from our homes, from our marriages, and from everything else. If our

Leave all your worries to Hashem! expectations are not fulfilled, we are not happy.

"Our job," Reb Yehoshua told his audience, "is not to allow our happy meters' to be set by influences from the outside world. We can't allow foreign ideas to tell us what we need in order to

be content with our lives. The Torah tells us to find satisfaction in simplicity so that we will be able to channel our energies into serving Hashem. And if we recognize that this world is only a prozdor, a corridor leading to Olam Haba, it will make it much easier for us to be satisfied with less."

Reb Yehoshua paused meaningfully. "My friends," he said, "I am going to do something right now that will lower the level of all of your happy meters. I would like to ask every one of you to stand up so that we can do the hokey pokey."

Puzzled, the teenagers rose to their feet. But their mystification did not last long. They immediately saw that Reb Yehoshua did not stand up — because

he was unable to. Reb Yehoshua is a quadriplegic, paralyzed from the neck down due to a car accident in the summer of 2007. That accident took the life of another passenger in the car and changed Reb Yehoshua's life forever. The audience was in tears as Reb Yehoshua demonstrated how he could not lift his legs and shake them all about, and how he could barely lift his arms to shake them. When he did raise his arms, it was clear that he had very little control over his fingers. But the most incredible part of the scene was the broad smile plastered across his face as he spun around over and over again in his wheelchair, demonstrating his own unique version of the "hokey pokey."

If anyone could have an excuse for lacking simchas hachayim, it would have to be Reb Yehoshua Hoffman. Before the traumatic accident, he was a powerhouse of energy, a person who was constantly on the move and who shuckled (swayed) intensely whenever he davened and learned. His debilitating injury robbed him of all that and much more. He needs help to perform even the simplest tasks. He cannot take his own food out of the refrigerator, wash his own hands, tie his own shoes, or even turn himself from side to side in bed in order to avoid the dreaded bed sores. It is not difficult to imagine the average person surrendering to de-

spair under such oppressive circumstances. But Reb Yehoshua is always filled with joy.

Reb Yehoshua's joy is matched only by the boundless energy with which he remains committed to avodas Hashem. With the help of his devoted eishes chayil, he

learns two full sedarim a day and gives many classes to young boys and adults. Above all, Reb Yehoshua refuses to allow his disability to prevent him from observing any halachah, even a chumra or minhag. He never bentches without a bentcher or fails to wash mayim acharonim, despite the strenuous effort that he requires merely to wheel himself across a room to get a bentcher or get to a sink.

Reb Yehoshua's unflagging simchas hachayim and commitment to mitzvos is a function of his perspective on life. He has internalized what Chazal teach us—that this world is nothing but a prozdor, and that we acquire true happiness when we gear our lives to preparing for Olam Haba. True living is living that centers around Olam Haba. Reb Yehoshua broadcasts this message in every waking moment of his life and has made an everlasting impact on everyone who has come into contact with him.

We have all known good people who have suffered from extraordinary anguish, whether due to medical problems, financial problems, problems with their children, or a vast array of other painful or tragic situations. Why do good people suffer? Rav Dessler writes (Michtav Me'Eliyahu vol. 1, p. 22) that the answer to this question lies in the principle of kiddush Hashem. Kiddush Hashem is the most fundamental, all-embracing mitzvah in the Torah; it is the basis of all of the Torah's mitzvos and all of our avodas Hashem. Everything we do must be geared toward the all-encompassing goal of bringing honor to Hashem.

In order for us to achieve this goal, Hashem created a world in which every individual would have a unique



role to play in bringing about kiddush Hashem. Every person is placed in a different set of life circumstances in which his or her personal avodah is to serve Hashem as much as possible in light of those circumstances. As

Rav Dessler writes, some people are subjected to the nisayon of wealth and are expected to serve Hashem despite the temptations of affluence, while others are given the nisayon of poverty and hardship. When every Jew serves Hashem properly in his own unique life circumstances, the avodah of the entire Jewish people is woven together to form a vast, beautiful tapestry of kiddush Hashem.

Rav Dessler concludes his discussion of the subject with a powerful statement: Although we can never know for certain, it is possible that if the neshamah was asked, before it was sent down to the world, if it would prefer a life of ease and comfort or one of hardship and suffering, it might in fact have chosen the latter. After all, Rav Dessler points out, it may be easier for a person whose life is filled with pain to remain aware of the fact that this world is a place to prepare for Olam Haba and to invest energy into developing a close relationship with Hashem.

Reb Yehoshua Hoffman is a person who knows how to look past the fleeting life of Olam Hazeh and perceive the profound meaning underlying it. He is content with his situation because he recognizes that Hashem created him in order to serve Him through the hardships and challenges that he experiences every day. By maintaining his visible feelings of joy and contentment with his situation, Reb Yehoshua creates the greatest possible kiddush Hashem.

I was debating what to do and then I remembered that Rav Golombek always says that one never loses when one does a Mitzvah. When someone is mevater,



There is a Medarash Devarim Rabba which states, "Hashem says: listen to my children for no one who listens to me will lose out because of it, as it says in Mishlei: One who keeps a mitzvah will know of nothing bad."

Similarly, in Pirkei Avot 2:8 the Rambam writes that a lender should know that if for some reason a borrower cannot pay back the loan, Hashem will make sure that he will get repaid! As the Pasuk says (Tehilim 37:21) 'although a wicked person will borrow and not pay back, Hashem Will kindly pay money Shabbat Shalom U'mevorach! [back to the lender]!'





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

Did you know? Every time you daven without kavana, in-



stead of thinking, "Oh, what was my tefilla worth?" you should be machshiv it anyway, and then Hashem will also be machshiv it! (From R' Yehuda Mandel, based on a Rema in Shulchan Aruch, Hilchos Yom Kip-

purim)

L'chatchila, tefillah with kavana is better, but once you already davened and you didn't have kavana, you should say, "Adaraba! This tefillah even without kavana is worth so much in Shamayim, now I know for sure I'm going to get answered!" (This point is true regarding all mitvos. It is so important to be machshiv every mitzvah that we do, whether I'shem shamayim or not I'shem shamayim, with kavana or without kavana.)

There is also a second point to keep in mind, that when you daven a dry tefillah without kavana, you don't feel good about it, you don't get the kavod and the gaavah and the sipuk, and therefore sometimes a tefillah where a person wanted to have kavana but was unsuccessful, brings a yeshuah faster than a tefillah where a person was able to have kavanah.

Rabbi Yehuda Mandel said over a story that there were two people davening together by a kever for a very big yeshua. One walked away cold-hearted with no feelings. The other one walked away b'hislahavus. Rabbi Yehuda said that he followed those two guys. The one who davened cold-hearted got a yeshua right away, and the other one got it six months after that. Rabbi Yehuda saw clearly that sometimes a tefillah without kavana, where you don't walk away feeling good, brings the yeshua faster.

When dealing with people, especially in Chinuch and Shalom bayis, we should not to be too critical. People



don't perform as well when they are in a setting that's too critical. Even if we won't voice our critical feelings they may sense it.

It's worth focus-

ing on their maalos and appreciating them; this makes them blossom and perform better.

Regarding appreciation, R' Mandel says there's always room for more, especially shalom bayis.

Pertaining to chinuch R' Mandel says sometimes parents have to get busy with their own life aside from their kids. When kids have parents that are too nervous about them and think about them the whole day they feel it and it may backfire.

R' Mandel says over R' Shalom Schwadron once told somebody who was having trouble with his teenager and this can be applicable to a lot of situations that "if you make nothing of the issue, it will become nothing."

In general a person should try to only see the good in others and like this, middah k'neged middah, Hashem will only see the good in him.

Of course, we should try to motivate ourselves if we are able to have more kavana. That's what we're in this world for. The more we grow, the more bracha we will have in our life. The point that Rabbi Yehudua Mandel is saying is that no matter what situation a person finds himself in, he should respect it and be machshiv it! The more a person does that, the more bracha will come into their life.

How Quickly Do We Forget?

In Parshas Va'eira (7:15) Hashem tells Moshe to go down to the water early in the morning and find Pharoah there. Rashi explains that since Pharoah declared he was a god, he needed to use the facilities secretly in the river to hide the fact that he was human. Many years later, Chiram, king of Tzor, also thought he was a god. He had provided the cedar wood for the *Beis HaMikdash* and had lived for several centuries. In addition, he had built a magnificent, multi-tiered palace suspended on massive pillars over the ocean, containing mind-boggling engineering wonders. He began to think that he was a god and would never die. Chazal teach us (*Bava Basra* 75a) that Hashem proclaimed: "I looked upon you, Chiram, and I decided to perforate man's body with many holes."

From both of these stories we see that one of the reasons we need to use facilities is so that we should never forget that we are human. This gives us a new understanding in that which we say אשר יצר את - Who fashioned man with wisdom." Hashem, with His infinite wisdom foresaw that man may come to think he is a god. Therefore, He created him in a way that he will constantly remember that he was created by Hashem and requires His constant kindness. Most of us are not in danger of thinking we are a god, but we do tend to forget about Hashem, and attribute our success to our own talents. So, the need for using facilities is indeed a way to remind us of how frail and helpless we are without Hashem.

But why did Hashem create the requirement to use the bathroom several times a day? Wouldn't once a week or at most once a day be enough? I saw an answer: Even if we do succeed in remembering Hashem, we quickly forget Him! Therefore, we need constant reminders. For that reason, Hashem gives us so many opportunities to find Him. Rav Ben-Tzion Brook zt"l, Rosh Yeshivas Novardok Yerushalayim would say this is what it means in *Tehillim* (37: 3): " אמנה - Trust in Hashem and do good; dwell in the land and **pasture** [nourish yourself] with faithfulness." When a sheep grazes, it doesn't have to lift up its head and search for more grass, because wherever it goes it finds food. So too, wherever we go, we can find Hashem – we just have to open our eyes. Yes, strengthening our *emunah* is something that we must do at all times, and Hashem gave us that opportunity to do just that each time we say Asher Yatzar!

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A GLIMPSE INTO THE PAST







Until now we focused on one main benefit of speech – the ability to give over and receive information. Like we already elaborated, this benefit is enormous and has a tremendous influence on every aspect of our lives. But there are quite a few additional benefits that we also receive from speech. Let's try to go through some of them.

When we speak to someone, we are able to make a fairly good assessment about them. We can tell if they have a strong personality or a soft personality, if they're organized or scattered, are they arrogant or humble, and many more personality traits and middos. One can also pick up some of these things through observing someone's actions or facial expression, but it doesn't compare at all to the quality and quantity that we're able to receive from having an extended conversation with them.

Speech is like a window to someone's nefesh. This is a very important tool to help us figure out who we want to befriend and who we want to distance ourselves from. The strongest example of this benefit is when we need to make a clear assessment of someone else to figure out if they are a fitting shidduch for us; someone who you can happily and effectively build a home with. Could you imagine having to make such a life decision just by observing facial expression? We need speech to give us the knowledge and clarity. This also applies to any friend or acquaintance that we pick. Speech en-

ables us to assess other people.

Speech is not only a means to receive and give over information; rather, speech also enables us to connect emotionally with people. When we speak, it's usually not just in a mono

Hello

tone - like a robot, devoid of life and feeling, rather, when we speak we express our emotional feelings. There are certain topics, ideas or demands that we feel passionate about, and we want to share our passion and feeling with others. Occasionally, we are jubilant and full of simcha, and sometimes we're upset or angry - and those are the feelings that we want to give over. HaKadosh Baruch Hu not only gave us the ability to talk, but he also gave us the ability to talk with emotion. He enables

Mitzrayim.

us to express and share a large spectrum of varied feelings.

This doesn't necessitate a different choice of words or a different choice of adjectives when we speak, rather the tone, the pitch and the speed with which we relay these messages. This enables others to understand us properly and deeply, and to respond accordingly.

It's such an important part of our communication that very often it's much more important how something was said than what was said. Obviously, this is a two way street. We as listeners can hear and should hear in the voice and tone of others what they mean to convey to us and what is deeply important to them, and we should respond accordingly. Hashem gave us in the gift of speech the ability to give over and receive emotions and feelings.

Carnivorous plants.

We have basically discussed all the main types, and as we saw, each



had a completely different mechanism in trapping insects for their nutritional value. We will see in future articles, BE"H, that Hashem made this world so complex and wondrous, so that we can be zocheh to get a glimpse of His immense greatness and His awesome abilities. This way we come to recognize His greatness and come to fear Him.

We will see this often in many creatures that we will IY"H discuss in future articles. For instance, there's a huge amount of spiders that capture insects in SO MANY different amazing ways. So, too, Hashem has made so many different types of Carnivorous plants for us to be able to see His wondrous handiwork. So, here's the last type.

Sarracenia psittacine, otherwise known as the Parrot Pitcher plant (because its head area is shaped some-

what like a turned down parrot's beak) is different from other pitcher plants



in many ways. The first way is that it lays horizontally across and not vertically, facing up. (See the pictures). All the other pitcher plants work on the principle of the insect somehow fall-


ing into the plant with some help of gravity, but not so with this pitcher plant.

Under the curved part of the head of the plant is a small hole for insects to enter the head part of the plant. Here, similar to other pitcher plants, the plant uses the smell and the taste of very sweet nectar. It has some on the outside part of the head and leading into the plant as well.

However, once it enters the head of the plant, the nectar stops and it starts to look to get out. The head of the plant, by the curved part, has a special type of thin "skin" that allows light through it. These are called areoles. These are false exits ("windows"). The insect is attracted to light and it "thinks" instinctively that following the light is the way out. It keeps trying to get out through those "windows" and finally exhausted it will turn around, and just follow the path downwards.

This leads the insect around to the bottom part of the curvature of the head, towards the long thinner part of the plant. As soon as the insect heads a little bit down that path, it doesn't realize it, but it has entered a very

long tunnel surrounded by stiff hairs, facing downwards.



surstiff cing re.)

for the insect to turn back, so its only option is to keep going forward. That takes it straight to the pool of digestive enzymes at the bottom of the plant, and by now we all know that these enzymes are made to be able to digest the insect so that their nutritional parts are

made available to be absorbed by the plant for its much needed nutrition. This plant "knew" that to catch an insect, since this plant is horizontal, it can't rely on slippery surfaces for the insect to fall in with the help of gravity. Therefore, it came up with a different "strategy" to catch insects. (Oh, you didn't know that accidental, brainless plants, can come up with "strategies"?) After attracting them with sweet nectar, it makes the insect

confused with the special light windows which helps it go the wrong way towards the pool of diges-



tive enzymes. Then, to make sure the insect can't turn around and go back out the way it came in, the plant luckily came up with another "strategy" of growing very densely placed, stiff oneway, downward facing hairs directing the insect straight into the digestive juices! Once again we see the Yad Hashem in all His creatures!

BL"N, the next article will discuss two new plants. Not Carnivorous. One that folds up its leaves when touched (It's like it's yelling: "get off of me"!

The other is a plant that follows the sun from East to West through the entire day! Quite amazing when you think about the fact that plants do not have any muscle system with which they can move themselves, so how is it done?! Stay tuned for the answers!

The way it was done it was put on the floor and you put a piece of wood on top of it. Wood comes from a tree that grows very tall and has a big trunk that is quite strong unlike the stalk of the wheat.

The wood can be carved in different shapes without breaking and it is made into ridges to press on the wheat kernels.

The man stands on the wood and hold onto straps which hold onto an animal that goes around in circles etc.

The straps that the man holds onto are made of leather. 114. Leather comes from the hide of

an animal. Leather is formed by a process called tanning and it is very durable and lasts a long time.

Rabbi Zevy Golombeck - A Life with Bitachon



Q. The Magan Avraham Siman 131 seif 5 brings that there is a minhag to say a different mizmor than we say, by nefilas apayim. But our minhag is not to say that mizmor because the Zohar says that anyone who says that mizmor without kavana will die before his time.

We hear on 'A Life with Bitachon' that Hashem is only love, care and rachmanus. How could it be that for lack of proper intention, Hashem will make a Yid die? It seems like such a terrible punishment. It sounds like a very strict midas hadin.

A. In order to understand and answer what's going on in Chazal and to explain it, we have to first explain two misconceptions.

The first misconception is that people look at dying as scary, frightening, a tragedy, and a tzara. Actually, there's no such thing as dying; a yid lives on. Every stage of life is an upgrade.

Going from downstairs to upstairs means you're getting closer to the Kisei HaKavod, closer to Hashem. A person should be viewing dying in a positive light. The thought should be, wow, I'll be going home! Just like every person likes to go home for the off-Shabbos, if you're in seminary or if you're in high school or yeshiva, we look for bein hazmanim to go home. Home is home sweet home. Well, everyone should realize that in Shamayim that's home sweet home, that's where the neshama loves to be! As we all know, it says regarding the neshama 'al karchacha ata nolad,' the neshama was enjoying itself in Shamayim, by the Kisei HaKavod. The neshama didn't want to come to this world! Being near Hashem is the pure happiness. Actually, Chazal say, when Hakadosh Baruch Hu made the world tov meod, 'tov meod zeh maves,' it refers to dying!

R' Yehuda Mandel said over that one of the big things that Navardok worked on is to realize that dying is not scary! It's not frightening, it's not a tragedy! Dying is something that's a positive thing. Everything that happens in a person's life







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

has to be viewed positively. Being alive is positive, dying is positive, Olam Haba is positive, yemos haMashiach is positive. Everything has to be viewed as positive, everything, without any exceptions to the rule! There's no such thing as anything scary, frightening, there's no such thing as a tragedy, there's no such thing as dying. There's no such thing as dying, a yid doesn't die, a yid lives on!

So that's a very important part that we have to understand and realize. That our job in this world is to only have positive emotions towards the various aspects and stages of life. That's our job.

The second misconception is the concept of dying before a person's time. Every single thing that happens is exactly at its right time, because Hakadosh Baruch Hu is perfect, and He made a perfect world. Really, in reality, in truth, is there's no such thing as dying before a person's time, because Hakadosh Baruch Hu is perfect, He made a perfect world and when Hashem made the world He knew everything that was going to happen, and this is l'chatchila. Everything Hashem does and did and will do is l'chatchila! There's no such thing as b'dieved.

Now, what does it mean 'before its time'? It looks to us as though it's before its time. That's how it looks to human beings. We are supposed to have the attitude that it's happening before its time. The point of having this attitude is because we should be doing hishtadlus to try to live what we would think is the normal amount that a person should



live. So, when we are told that a certain action brings someone to die before their time, we should stay far away from that action. However, in reality, there's no such thing as before its time. Everything is its perfect time and everything is l'chatchila. As my Rebbe said, everything is l'chatchila in gashmius and everything is l'chatchila in ruchnius. Everything is l'chatchila. Just to our eye it looks like it would be more l'chatchila if a person would live longer. What's that nogea? Nogea hilchos hishtadlus which is taka why it says in halacha, that we're not noheg to say this mizmor, because we want to do hishtadlus to live what seems to us to be the full amount of time. So that's why we don't say it, due to hishtadlus.

So those are the two points, that the concept of dying is not a tragedy and there's no such concept of dying because we live on, and before its time is not reality because there's no such

thing as before its time because everything is in its perfect time.


So now we just have to explain, now that we explained that there's no such thing as dying and it's a positive thing – so why do we want to live? If we should come out from this conversation that it's exciting to die, like we all want to go on bein hazmanim and everyone is looking forward to go home sweet home, and the Kisei HaKavod is home sweet home. Which is actually why the Ohr HaChaim HaKadosh in parshas re'eh in the possuk banim atem - laHashem Elokeichem Chaim kulchem - hayom explains that don't be like the goyim when a family member leaves this world they start scratching themselves and pulling out their hair, a yid doesn't do that, because a goy he thinks it's over with, goodbye Charlie, he used to be living and now he's dead, it's a tragedy. A goy thinks that dying is a tragedy and that's why he pulls out his hair, but the Ohr HaChaim HaKadosh says, a yid realizes that there's no such thing as dying, we live on, the neshama is by the Kisei HaKavod and because we are by the Kisei HaKavod, banim atem, we're children of Hashem, we're back home. So there's no tragedy that happens when a family member is niftar and therefore, do not pull out your hair, there's nothing to get excited about.

And it's written in the biography of Rabbi Avigdor Miller, that he went to be menachem avel someone and he said you know what the job of the family is to do? Picture the neshama, the niftar, as smiling by the Kisei HaKavod, he's basking in Hashem's shechina, picture him so happy, make yourself positive images because you realize that it's a positive experience. And Rabbi Avidgor Miller explained that that's why there's a halacha that you have to bury a mes that day, because a mes is a sheker, it looks like something scary happened, until now he was moving around and now he's not. That's a lie. Until now he was moving downstairs and now he's having a ball upstairs! So therefore, we have to bury the body to show that it's not the real truth. The real truth is that a person lives on.

But now we have a question. So why do we want to live so much if we realize that going upstairs is enjoyable? And the answer is because Hashem wants every person to enjoy their stage where they're living now. That means, as long as you're living, you have to say this is I'chatchila for me, I want to live. If Hashem wants me to be alive now, it means that Hashem wants me to make the most out of my life. The more I'll be able to serve Hashem and the more Olam Haba I'm going to get, the more enjoyment. It's an attitude. Again, these are all attitudes, that as long as we are alive we should want to live as long as possible. But at the same time, it should not be at the expense of coming to think that the next stage is b'dieved, a downgrade. It just has to be that as long as I am alive this is I'chatchila and then when a person leaves the world that's I'chatchila.

Now, it's very important to note that even though we say that dying is an upgrade and that it's l'chatchila, of course because that's all hidden chessed, we don't see it with our eyes, so a person could have bitachon for Hashem's unconditional love, and say, Hashem, I want to live to see Mashiach in good health. A person could have bitachon that he'll just go straight to Mashiach without having anything to be worried about.

So therefore, the answer to all these questions is that everything is positive and every stage of a person's life is positive, and we always go up, we never go down, there's only upgrades, there's no downgrades, there's only l'chatchilas, there's no b'dieveds. And the more we view every step of our life as l'chatchila, then we'll always realize that everything in yid-dishkeit is kulo positive from start to finish and everything in between.



Q. I enjoy reading sefarim on inyanei emunah and yiras shamayim. After reading inspiring material, I would like to discuss those concepts with my husband, and incorporate them into the atmosphere of my house.

The problem is, my husband and I are not on the same page. He's simply not interested in talking about these topics. This leaves me feeling disappointed; if only I had a husband who has a taste for inyanei chizuk I would have been zoche to a more torahdik home. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. The Gr"a writes that learning Torah is in order to achieve bitachon in Hashem. An authentic torahdik home is a home which is permeated with emunah and bitachon.

Therefore, if you so desperate- for children ly want a torahdik home, the first willing to githing to do is to internalize that crying baby.

Hashem is perfect and your situation was tailor-made for you, and there is no room for feeling bad that things aren't different. The situation you wish for is not good for you; it would be like poison. And you should become shikkur with simcha that in His infinite wisdom, Hashem put you in the situation that is best for your tikkun haneshama.

By internalizing these ideas, you are laying the foundation of a torahdik atmosphere.

Q. My little baby is very unsettled and cries around the clock. It's physically and emotionally draining. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. The first thing is, thank Hashem that you have a baby! There are so many people who are still waiting for children, and they would be willing to give anything to have a crying baby.

Next, learn to enjoy your baby's crying. Part of the frustration of a crying baby is that it's hard for a person to see his child uncomfortable and in pain. However, the Chovos Halvavos teaches us that a baby's crying is critical for his development. Also, every bit of pain your baby undergoes is necessary for his tikkun haneshama and is making his neshama snow-white.

While the baby is crying, listen to songs about bitachon. Let the words of bitachon sooth your neshama and make you calm.

Finally, to make your situation more bearable, tell yourself that this is just a passing stage. Interestingly, many people found, that the children they found to be most challenging ended up giving them the most nachas out of all!

has a family of four children bli ayin horah and was still living in a rented apartment. Hhe hadn't been able to buy his own apartment. He had managed to put aside some money over the years, and had some money invested in England. But it still didn't come close to what was needed for a down payment necessary to buy a dira.

Especially since the British pound had been dropping over the past few years, and last winter reached a rock bottom of 3.75 against the shekel.

He tried checking out a few of the cheaper places in the north hoping to find a suitable place, but being that he is not Israeli his family wouldn't feel in place in those places.

His family was feeling very unsettled and last Rosh Hashonoh he davened very hard to be able to settle down his family.

Two weeks after Sukkos, there was a knock on his door and his landlord was standing by the door. He said that he was selling the dira and people would be coming to see it.

The Avreich went to his Rov to ask him how he was supposed to deal with the situation and his Rov asked him, "Why are you not buying it yourself?"

He said it is impossible for him, even if he would try to sell his investments and use all the money he had put aside. The pound was too low and besides it was the beginning of a recession and it would be impossible to sell the investment for a decent price.

His Rov said to him that a family

cannot continue this way, and the price was very decent comparatively since it was a split dira, and his part was a few hundred thousand shekels less than a similar size dira. And there was even an available option to extend in the future. He told the yungerman that he should try to find someone to borrow some money from, and take a mortgage for the rest and Hashem would help.

He looked into it a bit and found someone able to lend him £50,000. Although the exchange rate was low it would nearly cover the down payment

He went to one of the Gedolim and the Gadol told him to go ahead and gave him a warm Brocho for siyata dishmaya.

Now this Dira, is a split dira and the owner was selling both halves together. This meant that even if the Avreich would buy his part, he would need to find a partner for the other half. He told the owner he was okay to go ahead, but it would depend on finding a partner.

One couple came to see the other half, but they decided it wasn't for them. A couple of days later, another person came to see it and was very happy with the Dira, but he decided he was not willing to sign a contract before checking with the bank that they would be able to get a mortgage.

They went to a broker, who started working on it. But after a month of working with one bank, the bank refused. He went to a different bank and everything was taking time.

After a month and a half, they

finally approved the mortgage. Then the person started finding problems with the apartment, one after the next.

After a few weeks of sorting out the first problem, he found another one and then another. After close to four months (!!!), he finally agreed to sign. Then a day before going to the lawyer he found another problem and decided to back out of the whole thing.

This was just before Purim and the Avreich was feeling lost. He had to start everything again from scratch.

On Rosh Chodesh Nissan the person who had first seen the apartment (!!!) came back and said they wanted the dira and would sign immediately.

A couple of days before Pesach he signed.... and by then (after all the politics with the government.... which to anyone who thinks a little, makes no sense and can only be Yad Hashem) the pound had shot up and was over 4.5!

When it came to selling his investment it was worth around 35,000 shekels more than he had reckoned when he started.

When it came to his last payment, he took a mortgage of 100,000 less than he had thought he would need, all without borrowing even a shekel more.

There were many more points of unbelievable Hashgocho along the way.... but this is already too long......
