day to the director of the program. He and his friends got tremendous chizuk from the boys by the event, it made a strong impression on them. But one thing moved him the most, to the point that he didn't sleep that whole night! When he saw dozens of children approaching



him at the end of the event to ask him for a bracha. All the children without exception went on to ask for a bracha for others who needed Yeshuos and Refuas. Or a bracha for them to grow up in Torah and middos tovos. But none of them asked for a bracha for gashmius. That made the biggest impression on him. Mi Kamocha Yisroel!

EVERY DAY COUNTS

There was a Menahel who related the following story: In his school, there were two brothers who were the top of the top. Besides for getting amazing grades, they also had wonderful Middos, and a burning passion to serve Hashem. The Menahel knew a secret about

their parents, namely that they were both Geirim. This led him to be even more puzzled. What is their secret in raising their children that are so extremely successful? He decided to ask their mother. She responded that perhaps this has to do with her nightmares. She then explained that these two sons were born before she and her husband became Geirim. The Halacha dictates that a minor who converts is given a choice when he becomes Bar Mitzva whether he would like to remain Jewish or return to his original non-Jewish status. An amazing story sent in from a reader who lives 'out of town.'

I have a close friend, a yungerman who was scheduled to move cross country back to the east coast with his family.

My friend's dream was that he wanted to become a Rebbi in a mesivta.

His move was scheduled for about four months away. He started the process of looking for a job and getting ideas.

It was a hard process and we started strengthening ourselves daily in Emunah and bitachon together.

Day in day out we worked on bitachon that he would get a job.

There was an additional hurdle because there were a lot of other things depended on his job: his wife's job, his children's schools and where they would live....

His job search wasn't going anywhere, so this yungerman started to further strengthen himself on bitachon and thinking positive. He learned about bitachon. We discussed it together and got guidance from our Rebbi. The yungerman set a date that by Rosh Chodesh Sivan he hopefully would finalize

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his job and then he can finalize everything else.

But Rosh Chodesh Sivan came and went with no job in sight.

Additionally, even with the prospective jobs that came up he was having a hard time getting through to people. Many people were not answering their phones. He worked on taking people out of the picture and that it's not dependent on people.

Many people were scaring him that since he had no experience, it would be near impossible to get any decent job. But he didn't get fazed by their remarks! Just the opposite. He started working more on Emunah and bitachon and that things don't run on the natural way of things.

It was hard work especially since nothing seemed to be working out. They had to eventually sign a rental place in their choice of town and get the kids set up with schools and his wife with a job. The hardest part was that he signed a rental and didn't have the job yet to pay for the rental. But he worked on bitachon that it's not the job that is paying the money, rather it's Hashem that's paying the rent.

He ended up moving without the job, but he didn't move with

empty handed. Rather, he was full with his trust in Hashem and with the firm belief that V'ne'eman Atah - Hashem is Trustworthy to those who trust in him.

When we departed, I told him: I'm not even going to be surprised when you call me that you got your dream job."

A few days after he moved, he attended a vort of his Rosh Hayeshiva's son. At the vort he met a long-lost friend of his that he didn't see or speak to in ten years!

They proceeded to talk to each other about their lives and my friend mentioned that he was looking for a job.

The next day, his long-lost friend was learning with his chavrusa. His chavrusa was a Rebbi in a yeshivah. This chavrusa then mentioned haphazardly that the 10th grade Rebbi in the yeshiva just informed the yeshivah at the last minute that he wasn't coming back for the coming year. The yeshiva was now desperate for a Rebbi.

This long-lost friend then told his chavrusa that he met my friend last night by a vort and that he was looking for this specific job.

They made the connection and

my friend had his interview. The Menahel was so excited over him, he loved him and was on the way to give his "yes".

I too called the menahel and relayed to him my information about my friend. The Menahel was excited about my information and thanked me for it.

He then told me a piece to the puzzle I hadn't known. He said that when their previous 10th grade Rebbi quit he called another Rebbi whom he had known and offered him the job. The other Rebbi responded that he had just signed on a shaky job in a yeshivah that wasn't for sure opening that year so he wasn't available.

The day after my friend had the interview and the Menahel was excited over him, this Rebbi called back and said that he changed his mind. The job at the new yeshiva was too risky for him and he did want the job. To which the Menahel told him, "I'm really sorry but I already found someone!!"

We see how Hashem was orchestrating this sequence of events, meeting the long-lost friend, the chavrusa relaying the information to his long-lost friend that a Rebbi left, the preferred Rebbi saying no because he chose a risky job and the timing was so exact.

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Furthermore, my friend had signed on a side job in a yeshivah in the afternoon. It turned out that it was on the way home from the 1st job. This was indeed the dream job which he eventually got and was near his family's preferred place of living and this job was better than any other offer he ever had on the table. Most of all we saw the big lesson that Vne'eman Atah - Hashem is Trustworthy to those who trust in him!

He asked the owner if he could take it and pay the next day. But the owner would not hear of it.

So, he left the leichter and went to a different store around the corner.

The fact that he didn't have time to go in Yerushalayim and the store owner in the first store didn't let him take without first paying saved them a lot of agmas nefesh.

After this ordeal he walked out of the store and saw people he knew dressed in Shabbos clothing walking to a chasuna. He stopped them and asked who is getting married. They said so and so is getting married. He said, "Oh wow I forgot all about it. I was invited to this chasuna and it totally slipped my mind." He was then able to go and be mesameach the chosson. THE MIGHTY POWER OF BITACHON

The following story is not just a one-time occurrence; it is the tale of a life of emunah and bitachon, related by the Rosh Yeshivas Tiferes Avigdor in Cleveland, a grandson of Rav Avigdor Miller zt"l, Hagaon Rav Yisrael Brogshlit"l:

I would like to relate the story of my life, in order to bring honor to the Borei Olam and to give chizuk to Yidden, so they know what a wellspring exists for them, a wellspring from which they can bring forth blessing and success in every endeavor. A person who lives with bitachon sees great yeshuos; he understands nature differently. Don't think that these are empty words. I will tell you what happened to me regarding one of the most difficult sugyos that a person goes through in life, which is marrying off children. Everyone knows it is a big nisayon, especially in Eretz Yisrael. Mechutanim who were zocheh to have their sons or daughters engaged told me how they thought this was time a for simchah, but the burden of huge sums of money necessary for the wedding and apartment expenses was so heavy, they could not feel any joy, and

the pressure threatened to break them completely. The mechutan, who ought to be rejoicing on the day of his

child's wedding, comes to the chuppah bent over in pain and worry. I am turning to those mechutanim to tell them my incredible story. I received ten daughters as a gift from Hashem Yisbarach, in addition to the dear sons He bestowed on me through His mercies. Immediately after my own wedding, I understood that this was the way: In order to merit a son-in law who is a talmid chacham, you have to give huge sums. I said to myself, A wise man thinks ahead. Every month I'll put aside money, so I'll have a sizable sum saved for weddings. And indeed, every month since the birth of my oldest daughter, I put a sum of money aside and invested it with a friend. Altogether, I gave him a lot of money, in the hope that this hishtadlus would help me when the time came. The sum reached a few hundred thousand dollars. My daughter got engaged, b'shaah tovah, and two weeks before the wedding, this friend called me and asked: "Are you sitting or standing?" "I can stand," I told him. "What do you want to tell me?" "All the money you gave me is gone." I asked him: "What happened? You made a deal that went sour?"

The conversation became more and more painful, for his answers hurt far more than if he had told me he'd made an unsuccessful deal. He sounded like a real ne-

bach when he told me, "No. There was no business problem here. I simply stole all your money. All the 'profits' I gave you were actually from the sum you had given me." I didn't ask what he had done with the rest of the money. It was clear. Many people invested huge sums with him, and

he lived royally at the expense of those who trusted him. There is much room to pity him, no room at all to be jealous of him. It is also possible to get angry at him, but this will not help me. There is no reason for anger, as anger will not get me my money back.

It's two weeks before my daughter's wedding, and I am penniless.

Baruch Hashem, I understood immediately that this was a nisayon. Until that point I had thought that I have to take care of myself. Now the Ribono shel Olam wanted to show me that He could take care of me even without my efforts. He showed me that he could be mesader everything for me. I don't think I did something wrong. It's okay for a person to save money for the future, but he needs to know that this is not the reason he will have the money when the time comes to marry off his children. The only reason he'll have the money for the wedding expenses, the bar mitzvah, or anything else, will be: If

Hashem wants him to have, he will have. Hashem is the only One who will send him the money.

He and no one else.

Twenty years of preparations were behind me. For twenty years, I was zocheh to learn inyanei bitachon from my grandfather Rav Avigdor Miller zt"l, and from my great rebbi Rav Meir Halevi Soloveitchik zt"l. They implanted within me the knowledge – not only in my mind but also in my heart – that no person can move a finger down here in this world if it hasn't been announced in Shamayim that he will do so.

At this time of nisayon, these good words of chizuk came back to me. They were like the provisions that Yosef Hatzaddik had gathered in the years of plenty to prepare for the years of hunger, and now they came into full use. I put down the receiver and said: "Ribono shel Olam, You are here with me now. Help me. Be mecha-zeik me. I don't want to feel lost and worried, as the yetzer hara wants me to feel. I want to feel Your strong and powerful Hand. I want to lean on You completely. You know all. This is the way You wanted it to be, and I am certain that You have already prepared for us everything we need for the wedding and everything else

it entails." This was so clear

to me that I was truly calm.

When the story exploded, people called and asked me what I had to say. "This is what Hakadosh Baruch Hu wanted," I told them. They could not understand how I was answering so calmly and patiently. "Don't talk nonsense," they said. "If you're continuing to live with such menuchas hanefesh, it's a sign that you got the money from him and you aren't telling anyone."

"I didn't get a penny from him," I answered forcefully. "What would be the point of storming in anger? If I kill myself, will it get me my money back? No!"

The other investors wanted to go to secular courts, but I withstood this nisayon as well. This is not the Torah way.

The days passed, the wedding came, and the question that you are certainly asking is: How was the money parshah resolved?

For my first daughter, I had taken upon myself to support the couple for ten years. I said to the mechutan: "I can't give the money ahead of time, but im yirtzeh Hashem, the couple will get what I promised each month."

"Where will you get the money?" my wife asked. I told her, "The Creator of the world knows that I need the money. Do I doubt that He will give me what to eat?

What to live on? I haven't yet seen anyone who doesn't have bread to eat. He will take care of this as well."

Baruch Hashem, I was able to fulfill my hischayvus, and everything went well.

The next year, our second daughter got engaged. The mechutan had very clear demands. "My son is a talmid chacham," he said. "I want him to live peacefully. The first thing I am asking is that even before the wedding, you put down \$100,000. Not shekalim. I don't want checks of Emunah and bitachon. I want cash!

"Don't worry," I told him. "You'll have all the money before the chuppah."

We set the wedding date for six weeks later, and he told me, "Remember, it needs to be before the chuppah." "Of course you'll have the money," I responded.

My wife sat there and kept motioning to me, as if to say, "What are you doing? Where will you get the money? She wanted me to tell the truth – that we were not capable of fulfilling such a demand. "There will be money," I told her. "You'll see." "Will you collect money?" my wife asked. She was really feeling the stress.

"No. I do not collect money and I will not collect." I explained to her that this shidduch was made in heav-

en. Did we choose him? The shidduch came, in a heavenly ordained way, and so will the money.

My son was learning in a very chashuveh yeshivah, and when he came home for Shabbos I asked him, "Who is the best bachur in yeshivah?" He told me the name of a bachur, and this rekindled a memory. When I was a bachur, I had learned with someone with the same last name. "Ask him if his father's name is such and such," I told my son.

My wife wondered why I was interested in such matters. It is not my way to ask about other bachurim. The words had come out of my mouth thoughtlessly.

A few days later my son came back and told me, "Yes, this bachur is the son of your childhood friend." I enjoyed hearing about it, and then I forgot the whole matter.

Three years later, a shadchan called me and said, "I have a shidduch for you, a top bachur, one who has all the maalos, worth looking into." I asked for the bachur's name, and he told me the name of the bachur my son had described three years earlier. I told the shadchan, "This is it. This is our shidduch."

"What's this?" the shadchan wondered. "Is this how you respond? Don't you want to look into it first?" I told him,

"I know without a doubt that this is the shidduch.

Three years ago, Hashem put a question into my mouth that I had never before asked in my life – not before and not since." It was so clear to me, that when my son wanted to travel to Eretz Yisrael I told him not to go, because then he would miss the vort. He insisted on going, and the engagement was closed without him, exactly as I promised.

"After such a miraculous series of events, do you still have doubts about money?" I asked my wife. "Hashem sent the chasan. Don't you think He will also send the money for the dowry and other financial arrangements?"

I asked my wife not to worry. This burden was mine, and there was no reason for both of us to worry. "Forget about the money, and prepare for the wedding calmly and with joy," I instructed her.

I knew where to get \$40,000. I had an insurance policy in Switzerland, from where I could get that sum, but I had no idea how to get hold of another \$60,000.

Thus four weeks passed by. We traveled to New York to shop for the wedding, and on the way back, my wife asked where are we holding with the money.

"Didn't we have a deal?" I responded.

"I'm just asking out of interest," she said. "We're holding by nothing," I told her truthfully.

Two weeks to the wedding, and we were holding by zero. We went home after five days in New York, and we found a large pile of accumulated mail waiting for us. I opened an envelope and saw a check for \$20,000, written out to me. I opened the next envelope and saw another check for \$20,000. And in the next envelope, another \$20,000.

I called to my wife, "Come see what's going on here! The money arrived! All the money arrived! Even earlier than anticipated, two weeks before the date, and the money is already here."

I called my mechutan and told him, "I am signing on all three checks and sending them to you as is, so you can be calm."

After the wedding, I began looking into things. What was this company that had sent me the checks?! I set up a meeting with the owner of the company and asked him: "Did you send the \$60,000?" I told him that I had received three different checks totaling \$60,000.

"Aah! It was you who received the money?!" "I hope it wasn't a mistake," I told him, "because the money is

gone and I have no way of returning it.”

“No, no, there was no mistake,” he assured me, and he told me his story:

“Several weeks ago, we moved into new offices and decided to computerize all our paperwork. So we were scanning all the documents, until I found a document dated four years ago. I had made a small deal with someone then, and he told me that he wanted all the profits from the deal to be sent to his rav, Rav Yisrael Brog in Cleveland. He gave me the address, and that was it.

“For four years, I forgot about the deal and the agreement, and now that I found the document, I started to look into how much profit the deal had made. I made an initial calculation, and I reached the conclusion that my partner’s profits were \$20,000, and I wrote a check. Two hours passed. I looked into the matter more, and I realized his profits were higher. I wrote another check for \$20,000. At the end of the day I looked into it again, and I realized there was another \$20,000 profit. These are the checks that I sent you.”

I was amazed. The Ribono shel Olam had prepared the money for me and had organized for the partner to move into new offices so that he would remember

exactly three weeks before the wedding, so the money would reach me on time.

These are only two stories regarding what I experienced in marrying off my children, may they all be well. For each child’s wedding the story was more wondrous than the last. I would like to say something to every father, every mechutan: Think and know and feel that these are not your children, these are the children of the Ribono shel Olam. This is not your money, it is His money. He only wants to test us, for He is our Father in heaven. We are only His workers, His messengers. A messenger has no need to worry about anything. All the responsibility lies on the one who sent him. When the messenger thinks that he is the baal habayis, our Father in heaven says, “You think you’re so capable? Nu, come, let’s see. If you want to tire yourself out, go ahead!”

Hakadosh Baruch Hu takes care of all His children and brings them everything they need – money, tuition, clothing in the summer and the winter, travel expenses... All the money they need, He provides for them. Will He not take care of their weddings as well?! It is His will that they get married. He will send the shidduch and the money. What is there to worry about?!

This can be compared to

someone whose mother invited him for Shabbos. He calls before Shabbos and asks tensely, “Ima, are you sure there’s cholent? The mother assures him that there is, and he asks again, “Are you certain there is?” “Of course I’m sure,” she tells him. “For decades you’ve been eating at my table. Was there ever a time that you didn’t get your portion of cholent?!” Hashem is inviting you for Shabbos, inviting you to the wedding of His children. Do you think He’ll bring them to an empty hall? How can our hishtadlus create such huge sums as are necessary for a wedding? Can we possibly do hishtadlus for sums of this sort?! We do hishtadlus when it is plausible, but here it is not plausible at all.

Here we need to collect checks of bitachon, to connect to the wellspring of bitachon, the wellsprings of successes and yeshuos.

May all of you rejoice in the simchos of your offspring with all your heart and with menuchas hanefesh. It is possible, for you are children of Hashem!

Trust in Hashem, and “rejoice, all who are of upright heart!” (Kav Hashgacha Pratis)

The Gemara is discussing various points and stories about tzedakah and chesed, and says the following story: A meshulach once came to Rava, and he invited him for supper, and asked what he usually eats. The meshulach replied that he is used to fine chicken and well-aged wine (tarnegoles petumah v'yayin yashan). Asked Rava, 'are you not concerned about spending public money - i.e. tzedakah money - on luxuries?' The meshulach answered, 'I have bitachon in Hashem, and the food is coming from Him; not from them'. He quoted a pasuk in Tehillim 145:15, which teaches us that Hashem gives each person what he needs - and each person according to what he is used to (Rash"i).

As they were standing there, Rava's sister - who

hadn't seen him in thirteen years - came, and she brought with fine chicken (a "meat board"!) and well-aged wine! Rava expressed his astonishment at how unusual it is that he should receive such a gift, and said to the meshulach that he apologizes to him that 'he spoke more than necessary', and invited him to come and eat!

Since it is so important to have saliva in our mouth for eating more than other times in the day, Hashem arranged that more saliva is produced when we are about to eat. This means that any time that we smell food or we see food, automatically our body starts producing more saliva. Not only smelling or seeing food helps produce saliva but even if a person just thinks about food, even if it is not in front of him, already he starts producing more saliva to help him in the process of eating, chewing and swallowing. Another fascinating point about the production of saliva is that the action of chewing itself produces more saliva, even when the person does not see the food because it is already in his

mouth. The more a person chews the more saliva gets produced, which helps get the food ready to be swallowed and digested.

We mentioned that for the overwhelming majority of people, swallowing happens without thinking about it at all. Once a minute, over the course of the day, when a person is up, he is swallowing his saliva without thinking at all.

But when we are eating and drinking we swallow much more often. There is a special chessed Hashem here which we may not be aware of. If swallowing would be only automatic, let's say once a minute, it would take a very long time for a person to eat a meal. If only once a minute he would have the opportunity to swallow he would have to wait a very long time when he is eating. A person would not be able to enjoy hot food more than a bite or two or a hot coffee after a sip or

two because after two minutes it won't be so hot anymore.

The same thing with carbonated drinks, if it takes five to ten minutes to drink a cup of soda it won't have much fizz left anymore. Hashem gave us the ability to quicken the pace of our swallowing when we are eating and drinking even though usually it goes much slower so we don't have to waste a big part of the day eating and drinking.

with. The only One who we can make truly happy with us is: Hakadosh Baruch Hu.

How does a person make Hashem happy? Says the Chovos Halvavos: when he tries to make his wife and children happy to the best of his abilities.

You worked hard planning a vacation to make your family happy. Therefore, Hashem considers you a successful husband and father.

When you look back at the vacation you should tell yourself, "The goal of the vacation was to serve Hashem by doing my best to make my wife and kids happy, and I succeeded in trying my best!"

You are upset about the fact that you are being blamed by your wife for something that's not even your fault. Rabbi Yehuda Mandel said about his Rabeim in Novardhok, that when they would be blamed by their wives, they would respond, "I'm sorry. I feel so bad. I made a mistake. I'll try to be more careful in the future."

If they felt that it would be constructive to justify themselves and explain their actions, perhaps they would do so. However, if they saw that there would be no to'eles in defending themselves, they would apologize, even when they were one-hundred percent right and the other party was one-hundred percent wrong!

The reason they acted this way was because they under-

stood that one of our chief accomplishments in this world is gaining the precious middah of hachno'ah, humility .

When a person habituates himself not to fight to defend his pride, he adopts the attitude that his pride is not the most important thing in the world. When a person hears criticism and is able to say the words, "I was not okay. I'll try to do better in the future," he is ascending the heights of humility.

You now have a treasured opportunity to elevate your neshama with one of the highest forms of perfection. Hummingbirds – the smallest type of bird, that can hover and fly backwards – are leaving for the winter. They fly south in the beginning of the fall. It seems the reason is not because of the cold; they can survive freezing temperatures, rather, since part of their diet is small insects, and as the weather cools those are not around as much, therefore, they migrate to warmer climates.



fly 500 miles over the open waters of the Gulf of Mexico! The non-stop flight takes 18-22 hours, although some do stop to rest on oil-drilling rigs.

They migrate as far south as Mexico and South America, and as far north as Canada and Alaska.

Once, in the spring, we saw a hummingbird hovering in the area where we kept the feeder during the summer.

Those who have feeders may know that they leave the NY/NJ area around Sept. 10-13.

The flowers in the picture are called Lantana, and are especially attractive to hummingbirds, although they'll go to others as well. We have a feeder with sugar water. You mix

4 parts water to 1 part white sugar, bring to a boil to kill any germs (bacteria or mold), then cool. You can keep extras in the fridge. Do not use any other type of sweetener. Wash out the feeder weekly with soap and water. You will need an ant-blocker on the string, so they don't go in. Otherwise, the birds don't like it.

The hummingbirds feed much before migrating, to build up strength. Amazingly, they will

Let me share with you a fascinating story about my Grandfather a"h. I heard this story from the recipient himself. This story goes back approximately forty years. There was a wonderful young man that worked with diamonds in Manhattan. One day, he suffered loss after loss. He lost a diamond and he lost a huge amount of cash. Understandably, he was devastated. He walked outside for some fresh air. He felt his whole life crashing down on him. It was then that he saw my grandfather. He went over to him and poured out his woes. He was expecting some sympathy, but it was not to be.

My grandfather gave him a stern look and said the following. "You are a ben Torah. Where is your Emuna? Don't you realize that all this is coming from your loving Father Hashem? Grab a hold of yourself and accept it with love." (Obviously one cannot say this to just anyone, and not everyone has the license to say such powerful words. One must know their place.) The man related that this pure and honest statement gave him such a jump-start that it gave him a whole new refreshing outlook at challenges, and at life in general. Now it was close to Pesach and in middle of class it suddenly hit him that since his wife was cleaning for Pesach, she might throw it out, and the garbage truck was coming that day. I quickly ran to make the phone call, but it was too late.

The Menahel stared at the Rebbe unbelieving and with tremendous awe. "I don't understand, how did you return to class following this incident? I would have been a broken man for the rest of the week, and maybe for the rest of the month as well". The Rebbe responded. "I am a Talmud of the famous Reb Godel Eisner. WONDER OF THE WEEK

As you enjoy the delicious sweetness of Challah in honey until Simchas Torah, you may want to think about what a wonder of Hashem you have in front of you.

The fact that an insect can make such a tasty treat like honey is of course something to marvel at and be thankful for but if we look a little closer at the life of bees, we will be blown away at what an incredible creation Hashem made.

When speaking about bees we sort of need to be a little specific about which kind of bee as there are around 20,000 different bee species in the world and over 2 trillion bees.

Of these, only 8 kinds of bees produce honey. So for clarity, we will be speaking about the wonders of Hashem's honey bees, but you should know there are many more incredible stories to tell about the other bees as well.

Honey bees live in colonies called hives that have between 20,000 to 80,000 members.

There are three different types of bees in the hives, each having its own role to play. In a hive, there is one queen bee, thousands of worker bees, and hundreds of drone bees.

The queen is the biggest of all the bees in the hive and has

the job of laying eggs to make more baby bees and to keep the hive unified.

Most of the bees in the hive are called worker bees that are all female and it is their role to build the hive, look

after the baby bees (called grubs), and collect food.

There are much less of the third type of bees called drone bees whose only job it is to serve the queen when she needs them.

So how does Hashem use bees to make the delicious honey we eat? It really begins when a bee finds a flower that has a sugary juice inside it called nectar. The bees have long tongues they use like straws to suck out the nectar and then store it in a second stomach they have called their 'honey stomach'.

When their honey stomach is full, they go back to their hives and transfer the nectar they collected to other bees.

The next bee chews on the nectar for about 30 minutes and then passes it on to another bee.

As the nectar goes from bee to bee it is slowly transformed into honey and stored in hexagonal-shaped storage jars made out of wax we call honeycombs. The bees then flap their wings over the honey to make it thicker until it is the right consistency and then seal it with a wax lid to store for later use.

Now if you are impressed with how Hashem designed bees to make honey for you, wait till you hear how He designed them to communicate with each other.

You may be surprised to know that bees are great dancers and do a lot of dancing. Unlike most creatures, bees cannot hear anything. In place of verbal communication, Hashem gave them a special language made up of dancing. Different dances have different meanings to communicate to different members of the hive important information.

While we don't fully understand the bee language, we have observed two of the classic dance moves they make and we know what they mean.

Continued We name these dances the waggle dance and the circle or round dance, both of which are commonly used by one bee to tell the others in their hive information about food or water they found.

In the round dance, the bee walks in a circle, turns around, then walks the same circle in the opposite direction, and then repeats the dance many times. The amount of time this dance take tells the others the amount or quality of food that she found but to explain in bee language where to find the food, the bee will use the waggle dance.

In the waggle dance, the performing bee waggles back and forth as she moves forward in a straight line, then circles back around to repeat the dance. It is the length of the middle line she makes, called the waggle run, that lets the

other bees know far away the food is. The direction they dance the waggle run tells the others which way they

need to fly to locate the food.

If you are wondering if intelligent dancing bees that have some crazy process of turning nectar into honey could really be true the honest answer is no, there is no way it could possibly be true. BUT IT IS TRUE! Hashem is Hakol Yachol and can do anything. With His infinite wisdom and unlimited power, Hashem can do the impossible and makes millions of dancing honey-making bees for our world every day!

They are real and Hashem's wisdom and kindness are all around us at every moment. It is just up to us if we notice it or not. So on behalf of The Jewish Center for Science, we wish you a happy and sweet new year, being written and sealed in the book of life, and that you notice more and more of Hashem's wonders that surround you all the time.

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THE AMAZING CODE

About two years ago Pesach time during the Covid outbreak, I was learning in Eretz Yisroel. I had some chavrusos in person and some over the phone. One of my favorite chavrusos over the phone was my nephew in seventh grade in New York, whom I'd call from Eretz Yisroel. He got quarantined several times, so I was zoche to learn with him very often.

As you know, learning on the phone is not so easy, and my nephew wasn't happy until he really knew the gemara cold. So I came up with a method to make sure that we were getting the sugya clear. I realized that in order to understand each step of the sugya clearly, we needed to find where each step starts, and what type of step it is. I started doing this in the gemara I learned. I would write what the first word of each step was, what type of step it is, and the step number. I printed up cards with this method on it, it's called "The Code", and I give them out to people I meet. B"H, people love them, and it has really helped many people gain clarity, and geshmak in their learning! Here's just one of the many stories of how people really got into

The Code and how it helps their learning.

I told one of my nephew's friends about The Code, and when I met him a few months later, I asked him if he used it. He said "sure", and he pulled out a cardboard flap of a cookie box with over thirty steps of sugya written on it! I asked him why he didn't use a code card, so he said that it was Erev Pesach, and he didn't have a Code card to write on, so he ripped a

piece off of the box of cookies that he had for the siyum, and learned a sugya with the Code.

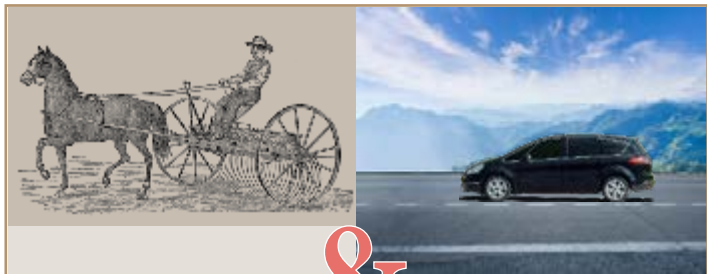

Sometimes people go through difficulties, and they feel like they are being buried, but in reality, they are just being planted!

One of the cornerstones of a Yid's Emunah is the knowledge that Hashem has a plan and journey for each person. Hashem guides the circumstances in each person's life and puts each person in the place he needs to be for him to grow the most and succeed in both this world and the next. When one goes through a difficulty, Hashem wants him to encourage himself and internalize that this is not simply an unfortunate situation; rather, it is Hashem helping him and guiding him in the deepest way.
