ZERA SHIMSHON, DOUBLE LUNG TRANS- PLANT AND MEMORIES

I discovered the Zera Shimshon sometime around Teves 5777 (January 2017). I then started receiving the weekly papers.

(The Author of the Zera Shimshon was Rav Shimshon Chaim ben R' Nachman Michael Nachmani. He was a gaon and a mekubal who lived in Italy about three hundred years ago.)

I added it to my weekly digital distribution as well as to four local shuls.

Next door to me is the 'Lev Miriam Bikur Cholim House'. There were two chasidshe couples staying there. One was Hershy Scheinfeld from Yerushalayim. He was there together with his wife and young child. And Rav Nachum Barnett and his wife also from Eretz Yisroel.

Hershy Scheinfeld's grandfather was my melamed in the Kalever Cheder in Cleveland for about 6 years, over 60 years ago. His grandmother was a sister to the Kaliever Rebbe.

So, when I heard who was in the Bikur Cholim house, I befriended him. I found out that his wife came to Cleveland for a double lung transplant.

The first night of Succos 5778, I went to Hershy in the Succah and told him we are going to start a new chavrusa shaft in Zera Shimshon: the three of us, Hershy, Barnett and myself.

I told him that I would order the seforim and he would give the shiur. We all agreed.

I contacted Rav Paskez to find out where I could purchase the seforim and he offered to sell it directly to me. I told him that I would have the local seforim store, Frank's Hebrew Book store order it from him, because I wanted to support the store.

So I ordered three sets from Franks.

About a month later, on October 31, 11 Cheshvan 5778, I was in the hospital

waiting to have my shoulder replacement surgery. The nurse came in at 11:15 am and told me the surgery would be delayed and would be at 1:00 pm.

So, I asked my wife, Judi, for my cell phone, as I wanted to check messages and make a call or two. I opened the phone and there was a text from my son Shmuli that said that donor lungs were found for Mrs. Scheinfeld!

I was very excited and with tears in my eyes I asked my wife to have my son Shmuli call Chaim Frank the one who sold us the seforim, to find out when the Zera Shimshon came in.....

Yes, the Zera Shimshon was delivered that Tuesday, the very same day the donor lungs were found!

Mrs Scheinfeld had waited over three years in Cleveland and two - three years in Israel for the lungs!

I was discharged from the hospital on Wednesday. I asked my wife to drive by the bookstore so that I could pick up the three sets of Zera Shimshon. I then dropped off two sets at the Bikur Cholim house before I went home.

We then learned together on Friday nights at my brother Shia's house.

I am a firm believer in the Segulah of learning the Zera Shimshon. I have repeated this story many times over. Dozens of people have since started learning Zera Shimshon.

In addition, I suggested something to the distributors of the Zera Shimshon in Eretz Yisrael and I received a call from Rav Yisroel Silberberg from Bet Shemesh. I told him the above story.

When I mentioned Cleveland, He said he had a connection to Cleveland: his great grandfather, Harav Chaim Yaakov Yisroel Berger zt"l.

I then asked him if his father was "Harav Itcha Zilberberg." We davened in his great grandfather's shul and I remember his father and family. What a small world!

R' AVI SHULMAN ZATZAL

We just heard about the petira of R' Avi Shulman, a.k.a. Mr. Avi Shulman. He went by the

title 'Life Coach', which, we might say is an English translation for 'Mashgiach'!

He was a mashgiach to many Yidden, and even large, frum businesses would bring him in to be available for employees to discuss with him concerns that were on their mind. Whether it was understanding why some received a larger raise, or whether it was classes on public speaking, which was also a skill he taught.

He was also one of the founders of Project SEED. A program where bais medrash (post high school) bochurim go to out-of-town communities for their summer vacation, and learn with the people there. They infuse them with some of the yeshiva spirit they have gained from. The bochurim also take trips in the afternoon.

I have a cousin who participated in the program, and at his chasunah some visibly "out-of-town" teenagers were present. One of them related that at one point, he was not sure where he was headed in his Yiddishkeit; he didn't have that much feeling for it. However, when my cousin's group came, he livened up so much that he decided to be a fully committed Yid!

Another great story in connection with the SEED program is brought by Ybl"ch, Rav PAYSACH KROHN in his book, Illuminations of the Maggid.

There was a bochur from Baltimore who since his bar mizvah, put in much effort to never miss a minyan. He would always look up and had lists of the zmanim for local communities and airports as his family went on vacation or to simchos. At eighteen, he had never missed a minyan since his bar mitzvah!

During the summer, he took part in Project SEED, together with his chaverim. Then, as he had gotten to know the community well, they asked him to come out again, this time, during the year. It was enough of a distance to necessitate flying, and the itinerary included a connecting flight. As usual, he arranged his schedule according to the minyanim available. He was planning on davening maariv at the community shul upon arrival – the one and only maariv minyan in the town.

That was his plan. Except that now, he heard an announcement over the loudspeakers in the airport that the connecting flight was delayed. The airport was very quiet – he hadn't seen even one other Yid, and the time to take a taxi to the closest town and back would cause him to miss the flight. What would be? He felt terrible! Would this be the first time he would miss a minyan since his bar mitzvah?! Was going to help an out-of-town community more chashuv in Hashem's eyes than making a minyan? As these thoughts swirled through his mind, he realized that he must let his host, the Rav of the town, know about the delay, as one of the community members would be picking him up from the airport. With a heavy heart, he dialed the Rav and explained the situation to him. He lamented how this might be the very first time since his bar mitzvah that he would miss a minyan! The Rav said that he felt for him, and that the delay was no problem. They were greatly looking forward to seeing him.

He finally landed, and the Yid who had come to pick him up was waiting. They drove into town, and, at one point when he thought they should have made a left – towards the Rav's house, he instead made a right – toward the shul. He asked him about it, "weren't we supposed to go left?" The driver responded, "no, right is right!"

They drove until they came to the shul. It was now 1:50 am, but he noticed that all the lights were on.

"Why are the lights on, is there a simcha going on here?"

"Come into the shul."

He figured 'OK, there is a halacha that if one has missed a minyan, it is still an advantage to daven b'yeichidus in a shul, if possible. "That is probably why he was bringing him there", he thought to himself, "the Rav must have advised to help him out as best as possible. But why were the lights on?!"

As they entered the shul, eight men – of all ages, literally – stood there in front of them smiling. It took a moment to realize that they had not yet davened Maariv!

The Rav explained to him: "We discussed it among ourselves and decided that if it means that much to you, it means that much to us! 'Vehu rachum...!'"

Rav Krohn concludes: "This story is nice in and of itself, but then, our hero became my grandson, and so the connection is even greater!"

So, this is another nice story that came about due to project SEED.

About public speaking, Rav Shulman has an entire speech available on the topic (as does Rav Krohn). I remember hearing it about eighteen years ago. He mentions about being prepared; if you are going to quote a posuk or maamer Chaza"l that is not so familiar, it is good to have it written out in front of you, so that you don't stammer over it. One should speak up loud and clear, as people want to hear, but if it is hard, it is uncomfortable for them. (Rav Krohn adds to make eye contact. And I would add that the sound system in halls should work well and be clear and even, as we have many speeches, and people really have nice things to say, but if it is hard to hear, it is uncomfortable. Consult those who do sound systems or music.) It is also helpful to have key points of the speech written or printed in large, on a paper in front of you – both the beginning of each segment of the speech, and any factual points you realize you have a hard time remembering as you practiced your speech.

My father took a speaking course by him, and Rav Shulman related the following story that took place in the course of another speaking course he had given.

He was giving the course to a group of several people in Monsey, and, as part of the course, at its conclusion, each person would prepare a speech – using the skills he had acquired and deliver it to the group. To make it real, they got permission from a school to use their auditorium. They turned on all the lights, and the speaker stood on the stage, using the mike, and the rest of the group sat in back, to give the speaker the feeling as if he was speaking to an entire room. One of the people

in the group was a Rebbi, and he delivered his speech on the topic 'what I would do if I opened a mosad'. He spoke about the curriculum and schedule and even the construction of the building! Rav Shulman related that several years later, that mosad existed!

We see an interesting outcome that can come about by-the-way from a program or chessed that one does!

Our tongues are extremely flexible, more flexible than any other muscle we have in our body.

What makes it so flexible? There are two very unique things that we find in our tongue that we don't find in any other muscles in the body.

One of them is that the way the tongue is made is that it is a muscle that is not attached to a bone. Every other muscle in the body is connected to a bone, but the tongue is a muscle that works independently of a bone. Besides for that, the muscles that are inside the tongue run in 3 different directions, from front to back, from the sides of the tongue to center and they run up and down. Horizontal, vertical, side to side; they run in every direction imaginable

so that we can move our tongue in so many different directions.

Why were our tongues created so flexible?

The reason is, because this gives our tongue another function. Our tongue also acts as the cleaner. After we eat food, whether it's fruit, bread or vegetables, any food, there are always pieces left all over the mouth, not everything gets swallowed down. So the tongue acts as the cleaner, it takes all these pieces off the surfaces they are on and it puts them in the center of the mouth to get swallowed.

A person can take his tongue to every tooth, just like a toothbrush, on the inside of the teeth and on the outside of the teeth, the tongue can make a half circle of 180 degrees and clean out the whole front of a person's mouth. We can move our tongue around the bottom set of teeth and the top set of teeth, the inside and the outside. It reaches every sin-

gle point and every single angle.

This is only possible because of the unbelievable flexibility, unique to the tongue. It really serves as a toothbrush and when we use a toothbrush at the end of the day we are really taking care of the few percent of food that got left - little pieces that got stuck between the teeth. But the overwhelming majority of food which is left after we finish the regular chewing and swallowing gets cleaned with the toothbrush that Hashem gave us in our mouth - the amazing tongue!

Q. My boss just called me up and said, "Your co-worker told me that you're not doing your job properly. Therefore, I decided that it's time for you to look for a new job."

After hanging up the phone, I felt like my world caved in on me. Until this moment, I was secure with a well-paying job. From one second to the next, I'm left without a source of income. How can I move on?

A. The Mashgiach Reb Chatzkel Levenstein Zatzal said about himself:

"I was orphaned at a young age. When I was a young man, just over Bar-Mitzva, I went into business to help my mother support the family. I would work all week, and on Friday I would come home with money.

One Erev Shabbos, on the way home I stopped at the mikveh l'chvod Shabbos. I hung up my clothes and toiveled. When I left, I felt my pockets and I realized my money had been stolen!"

Reb Chatzkel said, "At first I was crushed. I had just toiled an entire week to earn this money. Now, in a one moment, all the money was gone..."

"But then I started thinking: One second; If hard earned money could get taken away so easily, this is not what I want to invest my life in. I'd rather invest in something lasting that can't ever be taken away."

Reb Chatzkel decided to travel to Radin to learn in the Chofetz Chaim's yeshiva. At the time Reb Yerucham Levovitz Zatzal had just been appointed mash-

giach of the yeshiva. The first shmuess Reb Yerucham delivered was about living with emunah . Reb Chatzkel recalled, "After hearing that shmuess, I felt, 'My tefillin aren't tefillin, my tzitzis aren't tzitzis and my emunah is not true emunah!'"

The rest of his life, Reb Chatzkel invested in the pursuit of acquiring eternal emunah and disseminating it to his talmidim .

Reb Chatzkel reflected, "What I had thought was the darkest moment of my life turned out to be the brightest."

When we experience how jobs are flexible and money is transitory, Hashem is showing us that material possessions do not have inherent worth. The only thing that has intrinsic value is living with emunah and bitachon.

Now that you don't have employment, throw yourself on Hakadosh Baruch Hu. Say: "Hashem, I don't know where my next job is going to come from. But one thing I know. It's not my job that gives me parnasah. It's You, Hashem, that gives parnasah." When you recognize that your parnasah is in Hashem's hands, He will lead you to your next job .

The result will be that this black moment in your life will be the best thing that happened to you. Hashem is helping you fulfill the purpose of why you were created: not to show importance to anything other than Hakadosh Baruch Hu .

Q. My wife treats me like a shmattah. She bosses me

around. Go here. Go there. Do this. Do that.

She could be upstairs, and she'll scream out, "I need this", or "Go get me that". I explained to her, " I'm happy to help you, but I don't like being treated like a doormat". But she simply is not getting it. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. Hashem wants to rest his shechina on each one of us. However, in order to be a receptacle for the presence of the shechina, a person must be humble. About someone who is haughty, Hakadosh Baruch says, "I and he cannot reside in one dwelling."

Says Rav Avigdor Miller Zatzal, since people are born with a lot of ga'avah, Hashem sometimes can give a person a precious gift: a spouse who 'sees to it' that you shouldn't feel haughty in their presence. They order them around and talk to them without respect.

The way of talmidei chachomim is not to insist on receiving kavod from their spouses. When they felt their pride being trampled on, they viewed it as a precious opportunity to work on humility. When their spouses yelled from across the house and asked them for things, they stopped what they were doing and went over to hear what they had to say. Through constantly working on humility and patience, they became great and achieved the levels that they reached.

Therefore, if your wife is bossing

you around, and you can't influence her with darchei no'am to change, instead of becoming dejected over your honor that is being 'desecrated', realize that you have the opportunity to see past your own honor and choose to invest on acquiring the greatest of all middos: the middah of humility. By doing so, you are allowing Hashem's shechinah to rest on you – with all the brachah that comes along. And by this, your wife will come to respect you as well.

Q. Many of my married children came home for Yom Tov. I was so excited to be able to spend time with my married children and eineklach.

However, now that they are all here, I find that I'm working from morning until night accommodating everyone's needs. I am running around making sure that each child and grandchild is comfortable and has everything they need.

Instead of enjoying myself, I find it overwhelming, and I am beginning to feel a bitter feeling towards the family reunion. What is the emunah and bitachon perspective about this?

A. When it comes to inviting family and giving each one what they need, it must be done within the parameters of the mitzva of chessed.

When someone knocks himself out while doing a chessed, it can be mesirus nefesh for doing a mitzva. However, it may also be

mesirus nefesh to impress people, which is not a mitzva at all. What differentiates the two types of chessed?

A true chessed is an act that is motivated by the desire to go in Hashem's ways of providing each person with his needs. When the chessed is done with this mindset, although it may be very difficult and may entail a degree of sacrifice, inwardly, it is accompanied by the joy of having the opportunity to emulate Hakadosh Baruch Hu.

However, if a person finds himself feeling pressured and resentful, that indicates that his chessed is not driven by the desire to emulate Hashem. Rather it stems from an unhealthy place, and that is what's causing those negative feelings.

In your situation, if you feel stressed out and bitter, this reveals that the reason you are running around to cater to everyone's needs is because you want to be on everyone's good list. You want to make sure that everyone is happy with you and will want to come again. Therefore, you are trying to make the best impression possible. Naturally, this can be a great pressure, "Oh no! If people aren't perfectly happy, they aren't going to have a good time, and they'll think that my house is not so much fun. I'd better make sure that everyone is happy..."

The truth is, when you run around and tend to your family's needs with this intention, you are not serving Hashem. Rather, you are serving your own kavod!

You want to make sure everyone is happy with you.

The way to cure yourself is to internalize: hakavod hevel havolim – 'pride is vanity of vanities'. Tell yourself, "I'm not here to serve my kavod. What's the difference if people like coming to my house or not? I'm not doing chessed for the goal of serving my family. I'm doing chessed to serve Hashem, and Hashem wants me do chessed in a manner of darchei no'am – not in an unhealthy way that causes resentment."

When you do chessed with this mindset, you will try to do what you can to make your family happy and comfortable – at the same time not sacrificing your inner peace. Results won't concern you. Did you make a good impression or not? It doesn't make a difference. You did whatever you were able to, and that's what Hashem wants from you.

With this approach, you will be relieved from all the emotional stress, and you will start enjoying the company of your children and eineklach.

Chizuk Corner

The unbelievable power of a good word

In Parshas Lech Licha, Avraham Avinu is described as "H'Tivri". Chazal explain the reason for this title was because the whole world was on one side and Avraham was on the other side. In other words, not only did Avraham not go with the flow of society, he stood up defiantly against the whole world to denounce Avoda Zara and proclaim Hashem as the master of the world. We know that us Yidden also carry this title of Ivrim as we find this in a few places. For example, in Mitzrayim we were called Ivrim.

The basic explanation is as we said previously: that because we are descendants of Avraham, therefore we also possess this special quality. Until this very day, although we are a small minority in this world, yet we stand strong clinging to our belief in Hashem. We know and feel the truth, and we are not swayed by the vast majority who deny Hashem's Oneness in the world. Throughout the generations we stood strong and we even sacrificed our lives for our belief following the footsteps of our forefather Avraham Haivri. This is on a national level.

Idealistically, I believe we can bring this concept even further into our own personal lives, amongst our own society as I will explain shortly. But before I do, I will take a little detour and then we will return to explain how to apply this.

As we mentioned in previous issues, encouraging people is vital for their growth. Howev-

er, the opposite is true as well. Discouraging people can sometimes be detrimental to people's growth. If someone is embarking on a mission to improve themselves or to grow in some area, we mustn't discourage them in any way. Unless for



some obvious reason you realize that this is not the path for them. If someone is asking questions in learning, but you feel that they are not intelligent questions, do not dismiss them *chalila*. This person is trying to get involved in learning and he needs to be encouraged and not discouraged.

Here are two stories that show both sides of the coin. The famous Rabbi Yaakov Landau *zt"l* (Rebbi in Torah Temima) personified the concept of Chizuk. His thousands of Talmidim can attest to the tremendous amounts of Chizzuk that their Rebbe poured into them. As one Talmid put it 'He wasn't only a gaon in teaching, he was also a gaon in giving Chizzuk. It was related, that numerous times a talmid would ask a klutz kasha (a silly question). Instead of dismissing it or embarrassing the talmid, Rabbi Landau would brilliantly weave the question into an amazing question, thus

upholding the talmid's honor and would would make him feel like a million dollars in the process. This in turn would encourage the Talmid to move forward, building him for a better future.

Rabbi Landau *Zt"l* would say on Parshas Vayeira this vort. And as you will see, he lived with his teachings. It says that when the Malachim departed from Avraham "Vayakumu Hamalachim". He would say that the Malachim were elevated by the Hachnasas orchim of Avraham Avinu. Everyone that entered Avraham's tent would walk out uplifted, full of chizzuk. This is precisely how Rabbi Landau treated everyone that walked through his door as well.

Here is another story that shows how words of discouragement can be fatal. Before the war my grandfather learned in the same Yeshiva as the famed Gaon Rav Michael Ber Weissmandel *zt"l*. One day, Reb Michael Ber (as a young Bachur) came up with a brilliant question in learning. He asked around and nobody had a proper answer for him. At one point he asked his question to an elderly Yid. This person (probably had good intentions) sharply rebuked the young genius. He dismissed the question and told him to move on in life. Reb Michael Ber turned white and had Chalishas Ha'daas. For a couple of days, he could not concentrate on his learning.

My grandfather *zt"l* took note of the gravity of the situation, and he immediately start-

ed doing some research. Baruch Hashem he came upon a Maram Schiff that addresses this question, and he ends off that he doesn't have any satisfactory answer. My grandfather ran over to Reb Michael Ber and showed it to him. His face lit up and the shine returned to his face. He returned vigorously to his learning and the rest is history. My grandfather, when he would recount this story, would end off: "Who knows what damage this well meaning Yid could have caused with the wave of his hand." We have to be so careful not to discourage anyone.

The obvious question is, that at the end of the day there are pessimists that will discourage us. There are people out there that may say negative comments to us that may hurt our self-image. So how can we prevent this from affecting us? What can we do to deflect all the negativity that permeates the society that we live in?

We have the Kochos hanefesh imbued within us by our Avos. One of these is the power to stand up for our values and not to be swayed by society. This is known as 'Azus of kedusha'. However, we can take this a step further. We also have the ability to build ourselves and not to be swayed and discouraged by other people. The obvious question is how do attain this Midda?

The Turtle: Reb Zelig Pliskin has a fascinating approach to this, and it's based on the turtle. The turtle has a beautiful pow-

erful shell that surrounds it. Some speculate that since the turtle is so slow, this makes it appear weak to its enemies. Therefore, Hashem gave it the shell. Whenever the enemy wants to attack, the turtle simply enters its shell, thus protecting it from its enemy.

Similarly, we can build a strong healthy shell that can surround us, and when our self-image is threatened we can submerge into our shell.

The obvious question is how do we create this shell. The truth is that for the children it's up to the parents and teachers to build this shell. How do we build this shell? We can bombard them with smiles and words of encouragement. Here are some basic examples. "Hashem loves you more than the entire creation." "I love you very much." "Yes, you can do it." "You are full of energy." "You have hidden strength beyond your wildest imagination." "I see tremendous potential in you."

Then there are the compliments that we can reiterate. For example "You really learn very well". "Your smile lights up the room". "You have a huge heart". "You have a heart of gold", and so on. We can focus on their positive traits and to put a great emphasis on it. Generally speaking, we should not say words of discouragement (obviously there are exceptions but we need to be extremely cautious when we do). All this, will create a strong shell that you created for them,

and when the challenge arises, they will be able to retreat into the strong shell, where they will feel safe.

However, if you are not receiving the chizzuk you need for whatever reason, you can create the shell yourself. You could compliment yourself by focusing on your Maalos every single day. Make time for this. Bitachon is also the key for our own Chizzuk as well. Additionally, our thought process needs to think positive about ourselves (which may be difficult as we discussed in previous issues). Tell yourself throughout the day, the same words of chizzuk we said earlier. However, we should not confuse this with haughtiness which is treif. Looking down at people is gava, while acknowledging our maalos is not. Gadlus Ha'adam is part of our Avodas Hashem.

Our brain has positive and negative energy. We need the positive energy to dominate over the negative energy. If we build ourself and others then this will bring joy into our lives which we desperately need. This will also create a strong shell that will protect us from negative forces around us in our society. With this we will be able to greet Moshiach with joy knowing that we were building people, and with this zechus Hashem will rebuild the Bais Hamikdash bimheira Biyameinu Amein.

Did you drink a glass of water today, wash your hands or go swimming in a pool? You may not have realized it, but you were coming in direct contact with one of the most marvelous molecules in the universe! In fact, it's the unique properties of water that enable all life on our planet to exist.



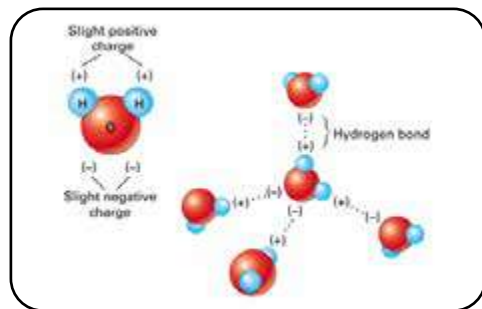
WONDROUS WATER

The secret to water's success lies in its exquisite design. Water molecules are made in such a way that they stick to one another. If you don't believe me, try filling a cup of water a little bit above the rim. The reason it doesn't spill over is because the individual water molecules pull on each other in very weak and short-lived bonds that scientists call hydrogen bonds. Although each bond is frail and doesn't last long, at any given time most of the water molecules are holding onto each other, preventing

the water from spilling over.

Water molecules don't just form

bonds with each other, they actually bind to just about everything they come into contact with. When something like salt falls into water, the water molecules grab onto and pull apart the individual atoms that it is made up of. In a short amount of time, water can dissolve many of the substances needed for life. If not for water, the nutrients you need to stay healthy would be too big for the microscopic cells of your body



it froze, most oceans and lakes would freeze solid in the winter and the countless creatures that live in them would die from the cold. Hashem didn't want that to happen, so He made it that when water freezes, the bonds between water molecules lock into place and the molecules are kept farther away from each other than when in liquid form. This results in ice having more empty space between molecules than water, making it lighter and able to float. The resulting

to use. Water helps break them down, making them useful and easily transportable to all parts of your body.

Another unique property of water is that it floats when it freezes. Every liquid other than water gets denser and heavier upon freezing which makes it sink. If water were to 'follow the crowd' and sink when

Enabling trees to grow tall is surely another wonder of water. Trees need a way to transport the water from underneath the ground to the branches and leaves. This is no simple task because the force of gravity is always pulling the water down towards the ground. The major force in water transport within trees is provided by the evaporation of water from leaves, a process we call transpiration. Since water molecules are stuck to each other, when water moves out of a leaf it pulls the rest of the water up along with it. This process is known as transpiration pull and can get water up to the top of even the tallest trees.



Isn't it amazing how Hashem uses

the seemingly simple water molecule to do so many things for the plants, animals and people of His world! If you want to see more of the kindnesses of your Creator, try thinking of all the ways you personally benefit from water. You may be surprised to find just how useful water is to you.

White Wine For The Kallah

Rav Chaim Pinchos Scheiberg Ztzl (1910-2012), the Rosh Yeshiva of Yeshiva Torah Ohr in Yerushalayim, was once being mesader kiddushin by a wedding when the caterer placed a bottle of red wine by the chuppah. Rav Scheinberg asked that someone bring a bottle of white wine so that the red wine not spill on the kallah's white gown. One of the men standing near the rosh yeshiva asked him if it's a tircha di'tziburah and would therefore be better to continue the chuppah with the white wine. Rav Scheinberg replied, "You will never be a kallah, so you can't understand how it feels."



The Emergency Phone Call

During his many trips to America to raise funds for his Yeshiva, Rav Scheinberg met with people until very late at night, giving eitzas, berachos, and chizzuk to those in need. One night, he went upstairs to his room past midnight, when the phone rang. His host answered the phone and told the caller that the rosh yeshiva had already went to bed, but the caller said that it was an emergency and he must speak to Rav Scheinberg. His host knocked softly on the door to Rav Scheinberg's bedroom as he was scared to wake him up, and Rav Scheinberg opened the door immediately. THE 'PILLERS OF CREATION'

The Webb Space Telescope recently captured a breathtaking picture which NASA entitled "The Pillars of Creation". These pillars are massive formations of gas and dust which are in the process of creating new stars and new planets, hence the name NASA chose. The pillar on the left is longest, at a staggering 25 trillion miles long. To get an idea of that size, you can try walking around the equator.... a million times. You would be at one thousandth the size of that pillar.

Which, in the vastness of the universe, is really tiny. The Pillars of Creation are just a small portion of the Eagle Nebula, which is just one of the twenty thousand nebulae in the Milky Way galaxy, the galaxy we also are part of. The Milky Way is just one of the two trillion galaxies in the universe. The reason the Pillars of Creation got so much attention is simply because the picture is so detailed and beautiful.

On a deeper level, Rav Chaim Volozhiner teaches us how each action we do, word we say, or thought we think, causes a profound effect on the myriad of spiritual "olamos" that exist. When our actions, words and thought are good, we build the olamos, elevate them, and add light to them. Hashem granted this immense power to man, and man alone. Even malochim aren't capable of causing such cosmic effects.

In earlier generations people had an innate emunah

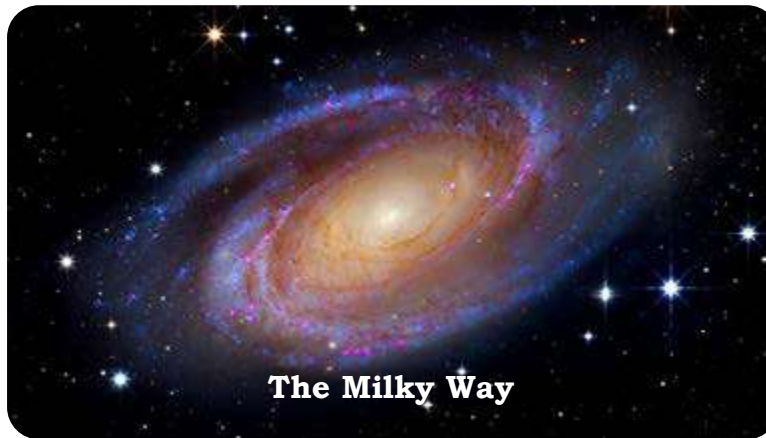

in Hashem and the power of Torah and mitzvos. As we get further from Kabolos Hatorah, the generations are weakened. (All the more so in recent years as kochos hatumah have crept into our world in areas such as science, kedusha, and materialism). It's hard today for us to internalize and live our lives with the notion that we have such power and such influence. So, Hashem gave our generation a gift, in the form of the Webb Telescope and the images it generates. With these pictures of the Pillars of Creation, we have a mashal to understand what happens when we do good – we can now actually see with such amazing detail and clarity the concept of creating new lights, new olamos!

Maybe, just maybe, it's not a mashal. The olamos and oros that are created by us are spiritual, and as sophisticated as a telescope will be it cannot see the spiritual. But we know that spiritual entities often have a physical manifestation. For example, we know that all the olamos are intertwined, cul-

minating in our world, the Olam Ha'asyiah. It would not be farfetched to suggest that the spiritual olamos and oros that we create with our maasim tovim, have their physical manifestation as these very planets and stars that are being created in the Pillars of

Some galaxies are as far as 93 billion light years away. There are an estimated 2 billion trillion stars, and endless other ce-

lestial bodies. Why was all of this created?

Imagine being on top of the universe, looking down. Find the Milky Way from amongst the other two trillion galaxies and then zoom into it, then into our solar system, then into Planet Earth, then to the country level, then to the state level, then to the city level. Zoom into a frum neighborhood and into a frum home. There, a person stands, upset and

about to say a sharp word. Right before the word comes tumbling out of his mouth, he pauses, bites his tongue and says something kind instead. - It is important to see the whole picture and not get bogged down with only the one detail of the situation that annoys you. Maybe this bird is helpful for one of their kid's behaviors, and they surely have no intention to annoy others.
- Maybe the bird helps them emotionally and helps them remain a happy and healthy family. Seeing the bird in the light of it being a source of comfort might help them deal with the noise.
- Perhaps, this was sent their way to help them deal with situations which do not go their way.
- If they manage to overcome this annoyance, they will be able to deal with lots of other noisy/irritating situations as well.
- Perhaps, one of their own kids really loves the bird, and this way in effect, they also benefit from the annoyance.
- Realize that it won't take that much time until they will get used to the noise. They then won't even notice the noise anymore.
- *R' Zevy Golombeck suggested:*
- *The Cohens could thank Hashem that they have ears and are able to hear. There are people who would pay money to have their issue.*
- *It was nigzar on Rosh Hashana about how much agmas nefesh a person is meant to experience. They are better off getting it this way and not through accidents or the like.*
- Take notice that the noise doesn't bother the Jacobs because they like the bird so they overlook the noise. If they'll be happy for the Jacobs that they enjoy the parrot, perhaps the noise won't bother them.
- First, validate the feeling of annoyance. Then, acknowledge that they are good people and when you ask them, they would happily move the bird to a place that would be less bothersome

A long-time ba'al teshuvah, who 'fell in love with Yiddishkeit' over 30 years ago, shares some of his insights and experiences.

PART TWO

"I vividly remember my first visit to a yeshiva for ba'alei teshuvah. In my mid-20's, I was at an exploring stage of life and casually accepted an invitation I received while touring the Western Wall to see what a yeshiva was like. As 'fate' would have it, one of the first students I encountered was a former university acquaintance.

I remembered him as rather unfocused, brooding and self-centered—in short, a typical college kid. However, this fellow who now approached me was notably poised, open and seemingly genuinely happy. It was almost hard to believe that it was the same person.

Therefore, when he encouraged me to stick around and touted what he had gained since similarly stumbling in little more than a year before, it was hard to write him off. Many of his fellow students also exuded these positive 'vibes;' there was little of the cynicism and unrefined behavior that was so much a part of the secular social milieu I'd come from.

Still, no amount of 'feel good' camaraderie would have been reason enough for me to change my life without a strong cognitive basis behind it. This I received in the classes I attended, which were taught by men who showed not only the vitality and composure exhibited by my friend, but who also exhibited obviously superior intellects.



The points they made were intellectually solid and convincing, but, beyond this, the fact that people of such mental caliber were simultaneously choosing to keep the Torah's ancient 'religious rules' intrigued me. (That the detailed and intensive study of these very rules was itself the fuel that kindled their intellectual acuity and refined character, I would realize only further down the road.)

Then there were the families. I'd grown up in an essentially functional two-parent home and no memories of abuse within it cloud-

ed my past. Still, to me and to most of my peers, the family was at best a neutral entity, a temporary nest that provided for one's physical needs until the child developed the "escape velocity" to pull away from its orbit and embark on his "real" life of friends and career.

Only when I began to frequent Torah-observant homes as a guest did I come to see the family related to enthusiastically and chosen as a primary source of identification. The parents and children (and often grandparents, aunts and uncles, cousins, etc.) seemed to genuinely and voluntarily share a common ground.

They studied the same texts, they sang the same songs—they cooperated as willing partners in a positive, unified endeavor. I observed a wholesomeness and focus, which despite its novelty to my eyes, was both intriguing and attracting—and could little be attributed to chance.

All of this, together of course with the quintessentially impressive chachmah of the Torah itself, combined to lend credence to the claims of the Torah's Divine, supernatural source. I can't say I had been yet 'hooked' on Yiddishkeit, but I was certainly intrigued.

Which task could take someone 6,000 years to complete, and he would still not be finished? Thanking Hashem for the life he lived (Chovos Halevovos Chailek Beis, page 34 in Lev Tov edition).

Working on thanking Hashem is a lifetime mission. It takes immense work to go against one's nature of being negative and dissatisfied. Rabbi Yehuda Mandel shlita wrote in his Bitachon Weekly that throughout one's life, Hashem deals with him in a way to increase his positivity and gratitude. He does this in parnasah, health, family matters, and even in ruchniyus; Hashem gives a person most of what he desires, and He intentionally holds a little back. He does not give a person everything, in order to test him whether he will focus on the positive and be grateful for what he received, or will he focus on what is missing and complain.

I recently read an amazing story about a talmid of Rabbi Noach Weinberg zatzal. The talmid recounted that when he and his wife were first married, his wife had a very negative attitude. She would second guess Hashem chas v'shalom whenever something did not go her way, and she voiced her discontent at all opportunities. At the age of thirty, she was unfortunately diagnosed with advanced cancer r"l. Her husband noticed that since she became sick, she started to have a different tune. She was less bitter, and slowly,

slowly she became very attached to Hashem. So much so that before she passed away, she told her husband, "I am not worried about myself. I know Hashem who took care of me in this world, will take care of me in the next as well. I am just worried about you having to raise a family without me."

About a year after she was diagnosed, the talmid's wife passed away. When this Yid met his rebbe, Rabbi Noach Weinberg zatzal, he asked him, "How is it that after she got sick, all of her complaints on Hashem r"l simply melted away, and she was able to become so close to Hashem?" Rav Noach responded, "Most of the complaints people have on Hashem are not from the big things in life. They are from the little things in life that did not go their way. When your wife got sick, she started to see life from a different perspective. She started to appreciate the big things in her life and was no longer bogged down by the details that did not go her way!"
