



UK Boy, B'Chasdei Hashem, Has Brain Implant Fitted to Control Epilepsy Seizures in World First

For thirteen years the boy suffered from treatment-resistant epilepsy, but thanks to a cutting-edge brain implant, revealed by Hashem, he is able to look forward to days without seizures.

Oran Knowlson is the first person in the world to receive this gift from Hashem, part of a human trial pilot study on treating Lennox-Gastaut syndrome, a rare form of epilepsy that can result as many as 100 seizures a day.

The 13-year-old from Somerset, England, needed around-the-clock attention and care since the age of 3, as some of the seizures were so strong they'd stop his heart and require him to be resuscitated.

After receiving the brain implant, his mother declared to the Guardian,

"The future looks hopeful, which I wouldn't have dreamed of saying six months ago," she said.

"For Oran and his family, epilepsy completely changed their lives and so to see him riding a horse and getting his independence back is absolutely astounding," said Martin Tisdall, a consultant pediatric neurosurgeon at Great Ormond Street Hospital, London, where Oran was treated. "We couldn't be happier to be part of their journey." During the surgery, Tisdall and the operating team inserted two electrodes deep into Oran's brain to a region called the thalamus. Wires were then run up to a neurostimulator on the underside of Oran's cranium.

Designed by Amber Therapeutics, with the wisdom given to them by Hashem, it delivers constant neurostimulation to help suppress the seizures by blocking the signals that cause them from reaching the thalamus. The device can be recharged by a pair of wireless headphones. Oran is one of three kids who were part of the pilot study, which is looking to recruit another 22 with Lennox-Gastaut syndrome.

"Deep brain stimulation brings us closer than ever before to BS'D, stopping epileptic seizures for patients who have very limited effective treatment options," Dr. Tisdall added.

"We are excited to build the evidence base to demonstrate the ability of deep brain stimulation to treat pediatric epilepsy and hope in years to come it will be a standard treatment we can offer."

Walking - Hashem's Wonderful Gift!

Millions of people who suffer back pain can, B'syata D'shmaya, ease their symptoms simply by walking more, claims new research.

Adults with a history of lower backache went nearly twice as long without a recurrence if they walked regularly, according to the findings of the first-ever study of its kind.

A clinical trial recently conducted by Macquarie University's Spinal Pain Research Group in Sydney, looked at whether walking could be an effective, cost-efficient, and accessible intervention.

The Australian researchers followed 701 adults who had recently recovered from an episode of low back pain, allocating them to either an individualized walking program and six physiotherapist-guided education sessions over six months, or to a control group.

The participants were followed for between one and three years, depending on when they joined.

Senior author Mark Hancock, Macquarie University Professor of Physiotherapy, says the findings, published in The Lancet, could have a "profound" impact on how back pain is managed globally.

"Walking is a low-cost, widely accessible and simple


exercise that almost anyone can engage in, regardless of geographic location, age or socio-economic status."

Only Hashem knows exactly why walking is so good for preventing back pain, but it is likely to include the combination of the gentle oscillatory movements, loading and strengthening the spinal structures and muscles, relaxation and stress relief, and release of 'feel-good' endorphins."

"And of course, we also know that walking comes with many other health benefits that Hashem has given, including cardiovascular health, bone density, healthy weight, and improved mental health."

HOSTING THE MINISTER

Car Nikolai was feared by all. He did whatever he desired, causing everyone to fear him. Nothing stood in his way; he even slaughtered his very close friends for no good reason.

When he stood up to conquer Poland, the Polish empire prepared to defend themselves. Seeing the armament of the Polish, many of Czar's own soldiers became despondent over their own chances of winning, and thus they seeded from the Czar and built up an army to join with the Polish against the Czar, known as the Bolsheviks.

It was a risky move on their part, yet opposing his view and unwilling to yield to his plan of action, they stood up and sided with the Polish. Understandably, the Czar wouldn't let this rebellion pass easily. He sent his special soldiers on a mission to find the rebel leader and deal with him personally.

Many attempts to ambush the Bolsheviks leader were made, but he always managed to escape. Eventually, though, the Czar's soldiers finally caught up with him. Seeing them, he knew he had to take drastic measures to free himself from their grasp. If he would be taken into custody and brought in front of the Czar, it would certainly be his end.

He figured out how he would

make a swift escape: rousing up his horses, he'd slip out of the



wagon and pass away unnoticed. While the Czar's soldiers would chase after his empty wagon, he'd be long out of sight. And so he did.

Soon after the soldiers passed, he ran to the neighboring town and sought a place to hide. Approaching the first house, he told them his story but they didn't agree to hide him. They rightfully knew what would happen to them were they found to have harbored a rebel of the Czar. After several such denials, finally a Yid welcomed him into his house, served him warm, nutritious meal, and gave him a room to rest.

Concerned that the rebel would be caught, the host suggested that the rebel dress like a davening Yid. He would go to the corner and stand as if he was davening Shemoneh Esrei. The Czar's soldiers certainly wouldn't be expecting the rebel leader to be davening like a Yid.

And so it was. It didn't take too much time for the Czar's soldiers to realize his rouse, and they began searching the neighboring towns to find the rebel. They went door to door but couldn't find him anywhere. When they came to this Yid's house, the rebel went to daven in the corner, and the disguise worked. The Czar's soldiers left the town empty handed.

The next day, when the rebel was ready to leave, he ensured the host that the day would come when he'd "pay him in full" for what he had done. The host didn't pay much attention to his words, thinking, "What's a poor, sought-after man going to offer me in the long run? He doesn't have much!"

Fast forward some time...

After many years of fighting, the Bolsheviks overthrew the Czar



and his monarchy and rebuilt the Russian government as they wanted. As the new Premier, one of the first things the rebel leader did was to send letters to those involved in having aided him in his rise to power. Included in the list was the Yid who'd hidden him the night he'd escaped from the soldiers.

When this Yid got the letter, he started to tremble. Everyone knew to stay away from the Russian rulers, but to ignore the letter wasn't an option. If you're called to appear before the ruler, you dare not ignore the call.

Scared and frightened, he headed to the palace. When he got there and showed them the invitation the royal doors were rolled open for him, and he was led straight to the inner chamber.

When he was standing face-toface with the Russian ruler, the latter questioned him, "Do you recognize me?"

Startled and overwhelmed, the Yid responded in the negative.

"You don't recall the day that you invited me and served me that delicious meal—when I was on the run?"

It was then that the Yid remembered the incident. Seeing this, the ruler continued, "At that time, you thought you were saving a so-called regular man, but I was the one leading the war, and now I was chosen to be the ruler. Those who saved the ruler are rewarded with extraordinary things.

"With the kind deed that you did, you facilitated in bringing about the fall of the Russian army and my rise to power. The doors to this palace are open to you from now on; whenever you need anything, here is the address!"

The Chafetz Chaim would repeat this story, and he'd draw a great analogy from it. "There are times when one does a mitzvah and thinks, 'What did I do, after all? It was nothing so great!' But when we come to the Next World, we'll see how each of our actions are greatly cherished. Doing a mitzvah is favoring the king, i.e. Hashem. Hashem, with his unlimited ability, will surely grant us endless reward for all that we do."

But the story only gets better.

R' Yankele Galinsky would repeat this analogy of the Chafetz Chaim and would continue to tell the rest of the story.

The Yid thanked the ruler profusely, but for many years never took up the new Russian ruler on his offer. Then, in the year 1921, when the tzaros started increasing, many bachurim of the Novardok Yeshiva tried to flee Russia without the required documents. They unfortunately were caught at the border and were arrested. They were in great danger, as the punishment for trying to escape Russia at that time was death!

They bachurim sent an urgent letter to R' Chaim Ozer, seeking his guidance, and R' Chaim Ozer immediately sprung to action by sending the man a plea to get him to reach out to the ruler to release them. Within a short time, the ruler kept his word, and the bachurim were released.

R' Yankel added with his humor: "The king addressed the man as saving the entire Russia, and I add that he saved Russia and another eighteen boys."

Who was among those boys? R' Yaakov Yisrael Kanievsky, known as the Steipler Gaon. Now we see what that Yid's action really accomplished: It saved the future of all Yidden!

SHOOTING IN THE FOREST

The Rav of Antwerp, Rav Chaim Kreizwirth, zt"l, who later be-



came a world-famous gadol and talmid chacham, was already a rosh yeshiva in Warsaw and Krakow as a bachur at only eighteen years old! Though he was one of the roshei yeshiva, he still slept in the yeshiva building, though, of course, he had his own room.

Once, he heard that there was a bachur from a small town who was coming to Warsaw for a few days to get special medical treatments by a big doctor in the city. The bachur's name was Yossel, and he was unfortunately blind. He was a very special bachur, who had memorized many Mishnayos ba'al peh and would constantly review them to himself—so much so that he was known as "Yossele Mishnah." Rav Chaim, out of his kindheartedness, de-

cided that he would go to the train station to greet this special bachur and help him get to the place where he was staying.

Rav Chaim waited at the station, and when Yossele finally arrived, it was revealed that somehow there'd been a mix-up, and no sleeping arrangements had been made for Yossele. Rav Chaim immediately said, "I know of an extra bed!" Rav Chaim walked him to his very own room and led Yossele to his bed. "Here is a bed for you!" Rav Chaim set up for himself a place to sleep on the floor on the other side of the room.

As it turned out, the doctor began a series of treatments that ended up taking a few months. During Yossele's entire stay, Rav Chaim happily kept Yossele in his room while he himself slept on the floor. No matter how much the talmidim of the yeshiva tried to convince Rav Chaim to have Yossele sleep elsewhere so that he, the rosh yeshiva, could sleep in a bed, nothing worked to make Rav Chaim give up this special mitzvah.

After a few months, Yossele finally returned to his hometown, and life got back to normal—though not for long. One day, a group of Nazi soldiers came and entered the beis midrash! It was known that when they did so, they would take away the rabbanim and roshei yeshiva or even kill them, without warning. Everyone froze. The leader pulled out a paper and began calling out several names. Those who were called were commanded to go outside. The names of a few of

the rabbeim were called out.

Then Rav Chaim heard the Nazi say, "Kreizvert!" Trembling, he stepped outside. A Nazi motioned him to the side of the building, indicating him to stand against the wall. As he stood there, another Nazi walked up and lifted his gun, aiming directly at Rav Chaim. Rav Chaim began to say Shema, and daven with all his heart. "Hashem," he whispered, "in the z'chus of all the Torah I've learned with such hasmadah..."

The Nazi raised the gun to his eye. "Hashem," continued Rav Chaim, "in the z'chus of all the many talmidim to whom I've taught Torah with such dedication..."

The Nazi's finger slid onto the trigger. "Hashem," pleaded Rav Chaim silently, "in the z'chus of Yossele Mishnah, and all I did for him..."

At that very moment, the soldier slid his gun down, and quickly said, "Jew! You're a handsome young man. I'd hate to kill you for nothing. I will shoot the gun and miss you on purpose. As soon as you hear the shot, run to those woods as fast as you can! I will need to shoot after you, so it will appear as if you ran away, but I will miss you. No matter what happens, keep running! If the others follow you, they will surely kill you!"

A shot rang out, and Rav Chaim felt a bullet whiz by him and hit the wall. He began to run and run through the woods, as shots rang out around him, and angry cries echoed through the trees. He kept running until it got dark. Eventually, he survived the war, and went on to live for many more years, becoming a Gadol Hador. He would always say that



he was certain that it was in the z'chus of his kindness to Yossele Mishnah

that his life was saved.

Every mitzvah has great value. Whether it comes easy or hard, Hashem values it, and stores away immense reward for us. But when it comes with a struggle, and it's not natural, its value is so much greater. The fact that R' Chaim was saved by the z'chus that came when he went out of his comfort zone shows how the struggle makes it so much more valued and cherished.

The End of the Copper Snake

In Parshas Chukas we find the story of the copper snake that Hashem commanded Moshe Rabbeinu to make in order to cure the Yidden who had been bitten by the snakes. What ever happened to that snake? The Gemara in Pesachim (56a) tells us that King Chizkiyahu destroyed it with the approval of Chazal. In addition, he hid a special book of amazing cures for every sickness, also with their approval. What was the reason for these two acts and was there any connection between them?



The *Meforshim* explain that he chopped up the snake because it still had a special curing power and people were worshiping it as a god. He hid the book of cures because when people got sick, they would merely cure themselves, instead of doing teshuva and trying to discover what *aveiros* may have caused the sickness.

If so, why didn't the earlier kings, who were also great *tzadikim*, destroy the snake and hide the book? The Chasam Sofer (ibid.) answers that it wasn't so simple to destroy this special snake, for it provided a great opportunity to strengthen our *bitachon* in Hashem. The Ramban writes (Bamidbar 21:9) that if a person is bitten by a poisonous snake, the most dangerous thing for him to do is to look at a snake. Here, Hashem commanded them to specifically look at a snake in order that they should internalize the fact that Hashem, the Faithful Doctor, can cure us even against the laws of nature, if He so desires. Therefore, they kept this snake in order to help people realize that any cure they may do really only works because Hashem wants it to heal. As long as the snake was around, we also were allowed to use the special book of cures. A person who used it would simultaneously search for ways to bring himself close to Hashem, which is the true message of the illness. Even though some people ended up mistakenly worshiping the copper snake, it was too valuable to be destroyed.

This worked well until the days of Chizkiyahu, when people started to use the fabulous book of cures to rid themselves of their sickness without trying to come close to Hashem. That was unfortunate, because it defeated the purpose of getting sick. He therefore hid it, even though people would not be cured as well as before. This was because the worst illness is being distanced from Hashem. Now that the book was gone, the copper snake was not needed to offset the danger of the book. And since people were worshiping it, he destroyed it. Again, because straying from Hashem is the worst thing in this world.

We all know that there are many sicknesses that are not curable, such as some of the types of the terrifying *machala*, may Hashem save us from it.

True, we must take care of our health and use the wonderful discoveries of the medical world to cure ourselves. However, we must not forget that Hashem is the One healing, and can do so in the most miraculous ways!

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
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

It was boiling hot outside and he was very thirsty. He had one dollar on him and decided that he would buy himself a cold soda.


