
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Like Mann from Shamayim



A Yid from Bnei Brak relates: B'sha'ah tovah, on the 26th of Cheshvan we celebrated my son's bar mitzvah. I had a hall: My parents live in a house in Chashmona'im with a lovely large yard, and they were happy to host our bar mitzvah. For food, I called a caterer and ordered 200 portions for the 26th of Cheshvan.

The day of the bar mitzvah arrived. We were all happy and excited. At about 7 p.m. I called the caterer and reminded him that the event was about to begin. And the man had no idea what I was talking

about: "Bar mitzvah?! Today?! I have nothing written in my calendar." "What?!" I was shocked. As we soon discovered, the caterer was confused; I had ordered the food for that night – the eve of the 26th of Cheshvan, and he'd understood that it was the night after the 26th of Cheshvan – the following night.

We had a hall, a bar mitzvah bachur, hundreds of invitees, and no seudah. I davened to Hashem to help me, and I started a round of phone calls. I went from one caterer to the next, and they all repeated the same refrain: No, they did not have 200 extra portions. This was not an extra two or three portions, which one could find on the spur of the moment.

I kept trying. Hashem would certainly help me and save me from huge embarrassment. Another caterer answered. This time I tried asking if they perhaps had fifty extra portions. They answered no, of course, but several moments later

they called back and told me, "We have two hundred portions for you. We'll deliver them in a few minutes." I did not ask questions. Time was short, and there was work to be done. The caterer arrived on time, and the food was excellent, truly like a seudas Shlomo Hamelech, and the guests who arrived had no idea that they were eating like Am Yisrael in the midbar. who received mann from Shamayim.

At the end of the evening I asked the caterer how he'd

had 200 portions for me, and why at first he said he didn't have anything, and only afterward he informed me that he had. The caterer explained, "When someone invites us to cater, we take down all the details - name, family, home phone number, cell phone, and, obviously, the location of the venue. But today, all that was written in the calendar was, "Moshe - sheva brachos" - just an anonymous listing. Who was Moshe? Where were the sheva brachos? I asked anyone who seemed connected to these words, and no one knew what it was all about.

"So I decided to take a risk and prepare 200 portions, because I figured it was better for us to get stuck with extra food than for someone else to get stuck with people coming and nothing to give them. We worked and prepared, and at 7 p.m., the hour when customers usually call and ask us to come, no one called. We waited a bit more, and it seemed there was no Moshe and no sheva brachos, but there was you and your bar mitzvah. "I waited a bit longer in order to be sure no one else needed these portions, and then I called you back." This is the astonishing explanation behind the two hundred portions that were waiting for me. It's amazing how Hakadosh Baruch Hu arranged our event for us in the best possible way. Here, there was a mistake with the date, so there, they prepared portions without knowing for whom, and Hakadosh Baruch Hu was saving us from a great loss and giving us everything we needed. 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Sefer Torah with Perfect Timing



This is Yisrael Yehuda Rotenberg from Tzfas. In the old Kosov shul where I daven there was a sefer Torah that had served the people devotedly until the Yid who loaned it to the shul took it back for himself. I wondered: What would be now? Where would we get hold of a sefer Torah?

Several days after the sefer Torah was taken from the shul. I was invited to the bris of the son of the shul's shamash. At the simchah I met an avreich whom I knew from years gone by. He'd learned in the Kosov yeshivah twenty years earlier, and we spoke of memories from the good old days in the holy city of Tzfas. He told me that he was married to an American woman and had several children. I told him what had happened to our city, and about the sefer Torah that had been taken back by its owner. "I have an idea for you," the avreich said. "My father-in-law, who lives abroad, recently made a siyum ha-Shas, and he wrote a Sefer Torah in honor of the event. The sefer Torah is now in a Litvishe shul. They took it even though it is written in ksav Ari, since they didn't have anything else. I wonder whether they're still using it. It's likely that they've already found a sefer Torah written in ksav Beis Yosef, and if so, my fatherin-law could loan you the sefer."

A few days later this avreich called

me and told me that the sefer Torah had been returned to its owner. "The shul moved, and they received another sefer Torah at their new location," he explained. "My father-inlaw says he can loan the sefer Torah, but it's important for you to know that he will need it back from time to time."

I wasn't happy about that comment, but I did not see any other possibility of getting a sefer Torah, so I waited for the flight that would bring in our temporary sefer Torah. Even a sefer Torah in the heichal depends on mazal, and even if it's one that you get for just a short period of time. When they opened the sefer Torah in order to turn it to the right week, I was surprised to discover

that it opened to the very parshah of the week of the bris, when I'd spoken to the avreich about it, as though the sefer Torah itself was asking to be read in the place where it was needed...

Several months passed. Erev Pesach came, and with it a phone call: The young man's father-in-law wanted the sefer Torah back. He was going to spend Pesach with his extended family; they would be having their own minyan, and he needed the sefer Torah to be with them.

What could I possibly do? This was his sefer Torah. We arranged to send it back to him.

That day, several hours after I had heard the sefer Torah being read for

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the last time, a woman called and told me, "My father z" I was born in the city of Kosov. When he was niftar, he left in his will a request that we have a sefer Torah written and bring it to the Kosov shul in Tzfas. The sefer is now completed, and we want to donate it to the shul." I was dumbfounded by the hashgachah pratis. The phone call came with such amazing timing! The previous sefer Torah hadn't yet left the shul, and the new one was already on the way, this time a permanent sefer Torah that had been written especially for our shul!

The Kalever Rebbe



One day, in Kolel, during my first year of marriage, I was feeling very unhappy about my learning. I knew that I wanted Torah to be my whole life, but I always had a habit of finding other things to be distracted with. I was feeling that I wasn't becoming what I wanted to become, and I felt that I had no ability to do it. I davened a very long and intense shemona esrei during mincha, begging Hashem literally with all of my heart to help me dedicate my life to learning His Torah.

That evening, as I was about to walk out of the door to night sefer,

the phone rang. It was the Kalever Rebbe's gabbai, asking for me by name.

The Kalever Rebbe is known to have something like ruach hakodesh. The only thing I ever had to do with him was a year or so previous, when he came to my yeshiva to speak to the bachurim. Then, after he spoke to the boys all together, he gave each boy a private audience, asking him a few questions, and offering advice to improve their avoidas Hashem. I saw many boys come out of the room, totally astounded and in a daze, as if they had just had a supernatural experience, saying things like "How did he know that?!" and, "I never told anyone that!" But my experience with him was nothing like that. He asked me a few questions, I don't remember what, and told me I should be learning 8 blat a day, which was basically impossible for me then (and now). That was the end of my unexciting association with the Rebbbe. Now, a few years later, his gabbai was calling me. I had no clue what for. Here was the conversation:

"Hello?"

"Hello! Is this Reb Shmuel Dovid? This is the Kalever Rebbe's gabbai. How are you?"

"Boruch Hashem..." (confused)

"Boruch Hashem! The Rebbe told me that you just got married, and he asked me to call you to wish you mazel tov, and see how things are going."

I was quite surprised to say the least- How in the world did he know I got married?!

"Boruch Hashem! Marriage is great! Thank you!" He probably wants money...I don't have any money!

"Boruch Hashem! Ah-! And how's parnossa?"

"Parnossa? Boruch Hashem! Perfect! We have exactly what we need. We're very happy!"

"You should have parnossa B'RE-VACH!!"

"Amen!"

Then there was a short pause. "Reb Shmuel Dovid, the Rebbe told me to call you and tell you that he wants you to dedicate your life to learning Torah."

I almost dropped the phone. He quoted my tefila to Hashem exactly! I could barely speak. I felt like Hashem was speaking to me, mamish! "H-How?" I asked, desperate to hear Hashem's answer.

"Well..." Somehow, it seemed like he wasn't prepared with an answer to that question. "Well, you have to commit yourself to your learning...Your head should be filled Torah, filled with tefilla, but not, chas vshalom, other things... The Torah should be your life."

I grabbed a pencil and whatever paper I could find, and started writing, my hand shaking. "Filled w/ Torah-" I repeated. I was writing as fast as I could. Filled with tefila was easy. I didn't have a yetzer hara not too daven. Filled Torah was hard. But I wrote everything obediently. "Not I"N, , other things..."

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twas a real nes! Bilaam was determined curse Klal Yisrael, yet Hashem showed him how the ability to speak is solely in His power. Consequently, Bilaam said a group of heartfelt berachos and praised Klal Yisrael for their virtues. One of these berachos was, 'they are a nation that arises like a lion cub...' (23:24). The Gra explains that this verse is the source for the first Halachah in the Shulchan Aruch: one should arise like a lion in the morning. However, practically speaking this is difficult. Often, we wake up tired and getting out of bed is difficult; how are we supposed to arise like a lion?

To answer this question let us explore a teaching of Rabbeinu Yonah, in the introduction to his work, Sefer Hayirah. He explains how when we wake up, we need to be in awe of Hashem's great kindness. How He compassion-

ately returns our neshamah and believes in us that we will use the privilege of another day correctly. When we truly internalize how fortunate we are and how compassionate Hashem is that He returns to us our neshamah giving us a new opportunity, we will eagerly get out of bed! So, we see how this berachah from Bilaam has tremendous significance. Klal Yisrael arises like a lion each day eager to serve Hashem, fueled by gratitude for the gift of a new day.

With this understanding, it makes sense why the first words we recite upon arising is modeh ani. We begin our day, expressing our gratitude to Hashem for returning our soul and giving us another day of life. Rabbi Shimshon Pincus explains that we begin our day with modeh ani to show that gratitude is the purpose of everything. All is drawn after the beginning, so the fact that the first word a Jew recites in the day is modeh shows us

how gratitude is his essence. Starting our day with strong feelings of gratitude sets the tone for our entire day. It is therefore of no surprise why Chazal wanted to put this parashah in krias shema since it contains this verse, which really sums up the avodah of a Jew: to start our day with an attitude of gratitude. The only reason Chazal didn't enact it, was not to inpose upon the tzibbur, yet really it is deserving to be placed in Shema Yisrael!

Surely, it will make more sense grammatically to say ani modeh. Just like we say 'I want', 'ani rot-

zeh', or 'I need', 'ani tzarich'. Why do we specifically say modeh ani? We need to be humbled by the great kindnesses of Hashem viewing everything we have as an underserved gift. We therefore say modeh before ani to symbolize our submission to Hashem

and that everything we have is from Him. We for sure don't start our day by putting ourselves first we need to put Hashem first.

Often we wake up tired and getting out of bed isn't always easy. Just pausing for a few seconds, trying to appreciate how fortunate we are to be granted the priceless gift of life, will help motivate us to say modeh ani with meaning and eagerly get out of bed, beginning a new day of avodas Hashem.

Many of our Tzadikim were very particular about this. For example, it was reported that Rabbi Yechezkel Abramsky used to look out his window each morning before saying modeh ani. When he saw the world still existing, he felt inspired to thank Hashem for His tremendous concern and involvement in our world, keeping numerous potential problems at bay. The freshness of a new day generated such incredible gratitude; he channeled these feelings into reciting a heartfelt modeh ani'.

A 30 year old avreich was diagnosed with a very rare and serious disease. A specialist told him that there was no cure for this severe illness and predicted that he would have around two more years to live. To the doctor's surprise, the man looked very calm. 'In my career of 20 years, I have had to make many grim predictions, yet I have never seen anyone look so calm, what are you thinking about that makes you so relaxed?' asked the astonished doctor. The avreich explained that he was thinking about the incredible kindness of Hashem for the gift of life! 'Even if your predictions will be true, I would have two incredible years of life. Every moment of life is

a gift that is undeserved. I will be able to rise each morning more than 700 times, and recite modeh ani thanking Hashem for returning my neshamah and for another priceless day of life. Hashem is my loving caring Father, who is to say He will not give me more of the incredible gift of life.' The Admor of Nadvorna who related this story, concluded by saying that it has been over 13 years since this grim prediction and the avreich is still waking up each morning, thanking Hashem for the priceless gift of life! A LIFE WITH BITACHON ON THE PARSHA

he Torah tells us how the Ribono Shel Oilam opened the mouth of Bilam's donkey. This obviously sounds like a strange, miraculous occurrence. Imagine walking into the Bronx Zoo and suddenly an animal starts talking to the crowd. Everyone's mouth would drop open in awe and shock. It would be the front-page headlines!

The Sfornu explains the message the Torah is teaching us. We have to realize that every single time we open up our mouths and talk, it is just as amazing. Really, we shouldn't have the ability to open our mouths. The only reason we can, is because Hashem is controlling it and He puts into our mouths the words we are meant to say. Like the Possuk says 'Hashem sefasai tiftach'.

Now that we understand that Hakadoish Baruch Hu is in control of our mouths, we need to realize that whatever we say, is what Hashem decided we should blurt out. The same is true for whatever one did not say. The reason why it was not said, is because that is what Hashem decided. Because it is He alone Who is regulating our voices, and not us.

Someone left a message: Before I started listening to A Life with Bitachon, each and every time I finished a conversation with someone, I would think to myself, "Did I say the right thing? Why did I say this? I should have said that!" I kept doubting myself and having regrets. It was not fun, to say the least. But now, it is B"H a whole different experience. I now understand that my job is to try to talk in the proper manner, but whatever I end up saying or not saying is what Hashem decides. And that means it is perfect and a complete success, and it is beyond my control for it to have played out in any other way. I feel reborn, as I am able to relax and enjoy every conversation.

So many times we think to ourselves, "Oh, I could have said better. I messed up." We can blame ourselves and it robs us from our menuchas hanefesh and simchas hachaim. But, if we internalize this message, we can be entirely calm and never second guess ourselves.

A respectful Rov shared: I give many drashos, and at first I always used to think how I could have inspired the tzibbur in a much more meaningful way if I would have added this or that point. But now I realize that my job is to prepare and do my best. What comes out is up to Hashem. This mindset made me so much calmer.



Harav Yechiel Perr Zt"I shared: I was once fundraising for my Yeshiva, and I was waiting in the lobby of a big philanthropist. I saw there were two other people there fundraising for a Yeshiva and they looked really nervous. They explained to me, "This gevir analyzes every word and the better pitch you have, the more money he gives. We are trying to figure out precisely what to say, how to express it and what to leave out." I thought to myself that I know that Hashem is in charge of what words come out of my mouth. I can just stay calm. The difference between me and them was like night and day. I remained calm, while they were sweating from stress.

A Yiddishe Mamme shared: I work in a corporation where lots of the employees really wanted raises. They knew it was very hard to convince the boss to raise their salary. People were sitting around discussing how to present their case. What should they articulate? How could they present their request in the most persuasive way to show the boss that they really are worth the raise? Many people were uptight and all emotionally involved. I decided to make my request calmly, while picturing how Hashem is the Spokesperson here. In the end, my coworkers did succeed in getting a raise. As for myself, I got a bigger increase than all of them. I went with Hashem opening my mouth, and with this, I made the best impression.



Bilaam blessed the Yidden four times.



agaon HaAdir Rav Pinchos Hirschprung was a blend of Torah Chaim and Ahavas Chesed. Besides for his obvious Genius in Torah, in his youth he was the Boichen for Rav Mayer Shapiro in Lublin, which entailed knowing 200 blatt gemara by heart. Everything he did was for the other person, he completely entered their realm of thought and was always looking for ways to give others kavod/respect.

I spoke with his daughter, Mrs. Carmella Nussbaum, who told me a number of beautiful stories to illustrate this Nekuda

of his greatness.

- A woman called Reb Pinchos with a shaila- her husband had a shul that had closed down, was she allowed to keep the money that was in the tzedakah boxes? He told her to come to his house to discuss the matter. Upon her arrival, he handed her \$100, a significant sum in those days. His daughter asked him Tatty she came to ask you a Shaila, why are you giving her money? He answered, "If she is asking such a question, she needs the money!"
- When he needed to go to the Polish ambassador for help with affidavits for yidden after the war, he obtained the book the man wrote and committed the whole thing to memory. The man was so excited that someone knew his book in such depth that he would do anything in the world for him!
- After meeting a yid and asking him his standard, "Vus lerenst du," what are you learning? the man replied that he wasn't learning anything. "Ich lern oich nisht." "I also don't learn anything," he responded to him. This came from making another person feel at ease- he never wanted anyone to feel uncomfortable! When he knew someone was going through a hard situation, he would not ask him "vus lerenst du" he knew a person struggling doesn't have the head to learn.
- There was a young boy who told one of the Hirschprung children that he was sad because he couldn't get new shoes for Yom Tov. Rav Pinchos asked the boy's father for a ride home from shul, and in the car he asked the boy some very simple questions on the parsha- that anyone would be able to answer. Then he said, "Wow, you know the answers so well, here is \$50!" In this manner he was able to unobtrusively help families get the necessities they needed with dignity.

Five minutes later, the same phone rang again! This time, the Rosh Kollel declared that the yungerman who failed to turn off his phone lost his entire

monthly stipend because he violated the rules, and should please identify himself during paycheck distribution.

Ten minutes later, the very same phone went off yet again! The Rosh Kollel now closed his Gemara and proceeded to walk out of the Beis Medrash. Just as the Rosh Kollel was walking out, R' Asher Zelig Rubenstein stood up and softly said, "I'm so sorry! It was my phone that rang three times.

I feel so bad." Everyone was surprised that it was his phone.

Around twenty-five years later, R' Asher Zelig Rubenstein was niftar and his family was sitting Shiva for him. Many Talmidim from all different backgrounds came to be Menachem Aveil. And then Hashem sent your father, R' Rubenstein, who sacrificed his own Kavod in order to save me
